## SPEAKS WELL OF WORK OF LOCAL ORGANIZATION

The eleventh annual meeting of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis was held in the board of trade rooms yesterday afternoon, with the president, J. A. Lively, in the chair. Dr. David A. Carmichael, superintendent of River Glade Sanatorium, gave an interesting address in which he praised St. John for the work which is being done by the anti-tuberculosis society, but he said that conditions in the province were not so good as there are from 3000 to 4000 tubercular cases in need of treatment, with thirty beds in the River Glade Sanatorium and sixty in the county hospital which could care for at the most 100 patients each year. He said that St. John is ahead of any other city in the Dominion in the provision of the best care of tubercular patients and also its preventive work. He spoke of the work being done at the memorial sanatorium and with regard referred to the death of its founder, Mrs. Jordan. Dr. H. A. Harris, superintendent of the East St. John County Hospital, after a short speech moved a resolution calling upon

the government of the province to take more interest in anti-tuberculosis work, which was carried unanimously. Dr. H. L. Abramson and Dr. A. F. McAvaney gave brief addresses. Miss Helen Sydney Smith, submitted her report. Officers Elected.

## FIRST FATALITY AT SAND POINT

The first serious accident of the winter season happened last evening about 7.25 o'clock on the C. P. O. S. liner Melita at No. 6 berth, at Sand Point. Alonso Doucett, a ship liner of Winslow street, West St. John, while descending a ladder into the hold of a ship in company with other men, one of whom was immediately above and one below him, accidentally lost his footing and fell to the bottom, a distance of about twenty-five feet. He struck on his head on the tunnel covering the propeller shaft at the bottom of the hold. His skull was fractured and death came while being lifted to the deck on a stretcher. He was attended by the ship's doctor and Coroner F. L. Kenney was called. The coroner considered that the death was purely accidental and that no inquest would be necessary.

He leaves a wife, who was formerly Miss Mary Brown of Cork Settlement; one son, Harry, a shipper in Fowler's Milling Company, West St. John; and three daughters, Mrs. Edgar Graham, of Somerville, Mass.; Mrs. William Wallace, of West St. John; and Miss Marie, at home. A brother, Alvin, of Digby, and one sister, of Digby, also survive. The funeral will be held on Friday morning at 8.30 from the Church of the Assumption, where requiem high mass will be celebrated.
