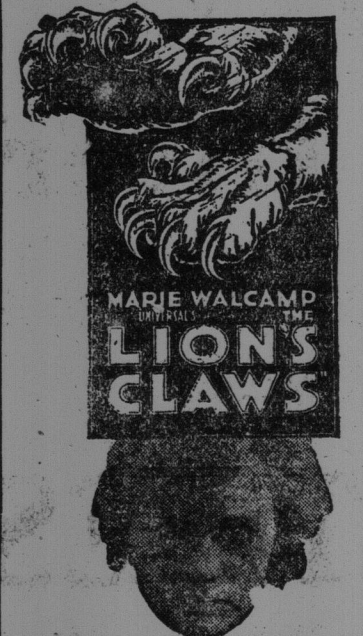

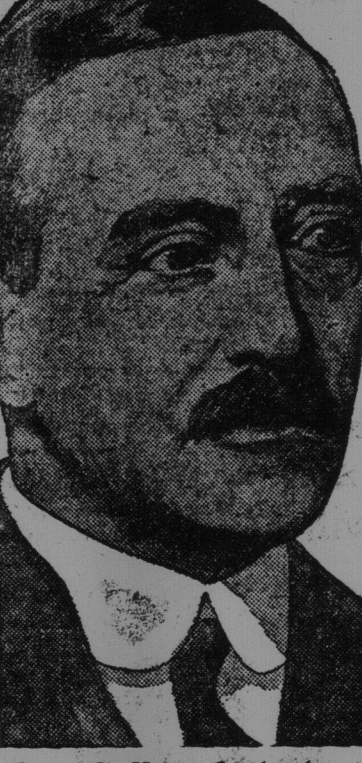

## LANDLORDS AND RENTS.

To the Editor of the Times:—  
Sir:—In Saturday's Times a property owner says the mayor is positively right in his statement that increased rents were unwarranted, that the price of boots and coal is falling, the price of living coming down, wages for the workingman falling, and war-time profiteering a chestnut. In reply I wish to say, a few days ago the mayor and commissioners increased the pay of every person in the civic employ, besides increasing the pay of all school teachers (and properly so), the reason given to the taxpayers being the increased cost of living. Quite recently the mayors increased their rate of pay to eighty cents an hour. If the plumbers, carpenters, and painters have reduced their scale of pay they are keeping it very quiet, but if such be the case the landlords will feel very grateful to property owner for making them wise to the facts, especially at this particular season. My last experience with the boot situation makes me think that there must still be a great shortage of boots. My coal bill for last month showed no indication of the reported reduction in price. On Saturday chickens were selling in the market at sixty-five cents a pound, and yesterday at fifty cents a pound. No doubt there are some people who would prefer to have all reference to war-time profiteering considered a "chestnut." The victims, however, think otherwise.

Sir:—In reference to the landlord in last Saturday's Times saying that rents should not be raised. That landlord wants to understand that it is not cost of living that is the cause of raising rents. It is the taxes that are going up yearly. I would also like to ask Mr. Landlord what rents he is charging for his flats, as well as the location, so that we will understand him better. Perhaps his rents are too high now, and that other landlords should not raise their rents. Also in reply to Mayor Hayes' suggestion that rents should not be raised, or, to quote the mayor's words, "I see no just cause for raising rents," the worthy mayor does not distinguish between the landlord who has been or is charging between \$30 or \$40 a month and those who are only charging half that amount for just as good flats and in as good a location. ## WAS ERROR IN REPORT

Washington, Feb. 8—Printing of the official transcript of testimony of Captain E. G. Lester of the army intelligence service, before the senate committee investigating German propaganda has disclosed an error in the Associated Press report of statements of Captain Lester regarding the employment of J. J. Dickinson in Washington by George Sylvester Viereck, before the United States entered the war. Captain Lester testified that Dickinson was employed in 1916, and in response to questions said there was nothing in his investigation to show any German connections or German activities by Dickinson after February, 1917.

The error, occurring in the report of a discussion, by Captain Lester, of a letter written to President Wilson after the United States went to war, in which Viereck protested loyalty, attributed to the witness the statement that it was only a short time after writing this letter that Viereck came to Washington and employed Dickinson as his secret agent to obtain information from the United States. The transcript shows that Dickinson's employment was discussed after the reference to the letter, but that Captain Lester did not connect the two incidents.

Mr. Dickinson appeared before the committee on January 17 at his own request, and testified that he was employed
