QUIMET BEATEN BY YOUNG MR. TUBBS

American Open Golf Champion Out on Second Round

BEATEN BOTH OUT AND IN

Winner a Very Youthful Brit—American Gloom Partially Dispelled by Victory of New Yorker Over Royal North Devon Clubman

Sandwich, England, May 20—Francis Ouimet, of Massachusetts, open golf champion of the United States, was defeated in the close of the second round of the British amateur golf championship by young Tubbs, of Littlestone, Kent.

Frederick Herreshoff of New York beat J. R. Platt of the Royal North Devon Golf Club by 4 up and 8 to play in the third round.

The third day's play brought together a bigger crowd of spectators than ever, owing to the open character of the competition. A large gallery followed the match between Ouimet and Mr. Tubbs, a very youthful local player from Littlestone-on-Sea, Kent.

Enthusiasm of Americans among spectators was soon sharply cooled by the way in which Tubbs handled the turn. He finished the round with two up and one to play. Tubbs' capd round was: Outward, 5, 5, 4, 4, 4, 5, 5, 5, 4—48; Homeward, 5, 5, 4, 4, 5, 4, 5, 5, 4—41. Total 89.

Tubbs did two strokes better on the first nine holes and one stroke better on the second half. His card read: Outward, 5, 5, 4, 4, 4, 5, 5, 5, 4—48; Homeward, 4, 4, 5, 4, 5, 4, 5, 5, 4—41.

The disheartening defeat of Ouimet cast a gloom over the American contingent, but the crowd was partially dispirited by a victory gained by Frederick Herreshoff in beating J. R. Platt.

Harold Weber of Toledo, Ohio, beat M. Karlise of Sunningdale by 7 up and 8 to play.

Charles W. Evans, Jr., of Chicago, today won his match in the third round by beating H. W. Scott, by three up and two to play.

The defeat of Ouimet in the closing round was a great sensation as had that of Jerome D. Travers, American amateur champion. It had been thought that Ouimet would have no difficulty in disposing of the comparatively unknown and youthful Tubbs who is a steady golfer but never heretofore had succeeded in achieving anything like championship form.

On the links reports were current today that a wager of \$15,000 to \$50,000 had been laid on Monday against either Travers or Ouimet carrying of the championship and had been eagerly taken by some who favored the American champion.

Campbellton Girl Dies of Burns

Dress Caught From Fire in Yard—Mother Died Only Three Weeks Ago

Campbellton, N. B., May 20—Mary M. Butler, the eight-year old daughter of Robert Butler, of this town, was fatally burned yesterday in her father's back yard.

The origin of the fire is not definitely known, but it is believed that the child was kindling a fire of chips in the yard when she accidentally set her clothing on fire. Her screams brought help and medical assistance was immediately summoned, but it was in vain, as death ensued four hours after the accident. Her mother died only three weeks ago.

PRINCE OF WALES' EXPERIENCE WITH LAUNDRY DRIVER IS QUOTED IN POLICE COURT

Six boys were before Magistrate Ritchie in the juvenile court this morning. They were reported by Policeman Briggs for shouting and acting disorderly in Barker street pleaded not guilty. Briggs said that on Sunday evening about ten boys were standing at the street corner, and obstructed the sidewalk to such an extent that pedestrians had to turn out into the street. He said some of the boys were dancing, while one was playing a mouth organ. They were there for two hours. Briggs could not swear that any of the three in court was acting disorderly, but they were with the crowd who were acting disorderly. The magistrate referred to the case recently reported in the papers, telling of the Prince of Wales being with a crowd of college boys who hid the laundry driver's horse. He said the prince got the blame for it, but was not guilty, and he thought the same thing might apply in this case.

EX-SERGEANT DECLINES TO ATTEND COURT ON A VERBAL NOTIFICATION

James Campbell, a former sergeant of the police force was reported on Saturday night for encumbering Union street with a wagon and not appearing in court. He has not yet appeared in court, although notified. The policeman who notified him said that he refused to come on a verbal notice. The magistrate said in court this morning that it did not take the former sergeant long to lose the authority of the court and that if he did not come on a verbal notification from the policeman, he could be brought in on a warrant.

MOTOR DRIVEN WATER CART

The purchase of a 1,200 gallon motor-driven and operated watering cart will be recommended at the next meeting of the common council by Commissioner Potts. He has become convinced that it is impossible to water the streets satisfactorily with the present equipment.

PROF. KIRKPATRICK DEAD

WILL BE HERE NEXT AUGUST

Dominions Royal Commission To Sit For Three Days

MAKING PREPARATIONS

Board of Trade Secretary Gets Request From Ottawa to Make Ready For Important Visit—Some of the Subjects to Be Gone Into

The secretary of the board of trade received a telegram this morning from F. C. T. O'Hara, deputy minister of trade and commerce, asking that all memoranda for the dominions royal commission be forwarded as quickly as possible, as the commission desires to study the information before coming to Canada. This commission is expected to arrive in St. John from Digby on Monday evening, August 10, and will hold sessions here, probably in the board of trade rooms, on the 11th, 12th and 13th of that month. Mr. O'Hara has written the board asking for rooms, and also for advice with respect to the reporting of the evidence. An expert stenographer will be required.
