HERE'S WHAT THE POWER CO. WANTS

Text of Bill Presented To Legislature

SIX CENT CAR FARE

One Cent for Every Transfer—

Maximum of \$2 for Gas and

Electric Light and Power Back

to Old Charges and Perhaps

Still Further Increase Later

Following is the text of the N. B.

Power Company bill presented to the

legislature:

An act to permit the New Brunswick

Power Company to make a tempo-
rary increase in its rates.

Whereas, owing to the increased cost

of operating the plant of the New

Brunswick Power Company, owing to

the price of coal and other supplies and

materials used by the company, being

more than double, the New Brunswick

Power Company has petitioned the leg-
islature praying that the rates fixed by

legislation that such company may

charge be increased during the period of

the war and the present high prices;

And whereas, it appears that in many

cases the rate such company is by law

permitted to charge is less than the com-
pany's actual cost of operating, and it

is desirable that a temporary increase

be granted to such company to enable it

to receive the actual cost of operating

and a reasonable return on the invest-
ment in the company's property.

Be it therefore enacted by the lieutenant

governor and legislative assembly as fol-
lows:

1. (a) The obligation of the com-
pany to sell twenty-five tickets good over

its lines of street railway for one dollar,
and six tickets good over its lines of

street railway for twenty-five cents, and

to charge a cash fare of five cents for
transportation over all its lines of street

railway, is hereby abolished, and instead
the company is hereby permitted to

charge a cash fare of six cents per pas-
senger.

(b) The obligation of the company

to grant free transfers is hereby abol-
ished, and the company is hereby per-
mitted to charge one cent for each trans-
fer.

2. The maximum price the company

may charge for gas for heating and il-
luminating purposes is hereby increased

to two dollars per thousand feet.

3. The maximum rate for electric

current for power and light supplied by
said company is hereby increased, in-
stead the company may charge not ex-
ceeding the rates heretofore charged by

the Saint John Railway Company for
power and light.

4. Said rates heretofore permitted may

be charged by the company in the event of
the continuation of the present high prices

consequent on the present war and the
consequent relative depreciation of the

value of the money received by the com-
pany for its services.

5. The lieutenant-governor-in-council,
on the application of the directors of the

company, may, if satisfied that the cost
of operating the company's property has

increased to such an extent as to render
a further increase in fare or rate neces-
sary, may grant such increase in fare or

rate in full or in part and permit the same
to continue whilst such increased operating

cost obtains.

6. The lieutenant-governor-in-council

may appoint an experienced person
qualified to pass upon such matters, to re-
port to the lieutenant-governor-in-
council as to the advisability of granting

such increase in rate as in the last sec-
tion provided, and may act upon the re-
port so made.

7. The expenses of such report shall be
paid by the company.

Another Riot in Quebec.

The riot was renewed in Quebec last
evening, evidently by the same gang of
men who carried out the riot the night
previous. Last night the newspaper of-
fices in Quebec were wrecked complet-
ly. The mayor of the city was forced
to read the riot act and the soldiers were
called out with loaded rifles to quell the
disturbance. Premier Borden has asked
an explanation from the mayor and has
sent representatives to secure reports.

ATTACKS NEAR ARRAS FAILED

held to their positions and wavered but

slightly before the enemy onslaught.

South of the river, however, the British

retired slightly between Fampoux and

Boiselleux.

There was hard fighting on both sides

of the Scarpe. To the north the most

desperate conflict was staged about

Reuex, which was the scene of sangui-
nary struggles last year. The Germans

succeeded in forcing the British to with-
draw from this place. North of Gar-

relle, the enemy tried to push the British

back on Bailliet, but were repulsed by

withering machine gun fire. South of

the British lines with all the guns. On

high ground near Albert there are five

machine gunners who are cut off 600

yards from the British lines. They have

been doing great execution among the

enemy. Tanks also have been doing a

small but important work. They have
