### A GREAT DETECTIVE. Death of Allan Pinkerton-An Eventful

Allan Pinkerton, the founder and head of the private detective agency, now known throughout almost the whole world, died at Chicago on Tuesday, July 1st, from the effects of a malarial fever caught in May last; but for a long time time he was in feeble health. He was born in 1818, near Glasgow, Scotland, and was bred a cooper, but on finishing his

apprenticeship became interested in the Chartist movement, which culminated in the Birmingham riots, and the arrest, conviction and sentence to death of some on viction and sentence to death of some of the leaders. Because of these political troubles Pinkerton married a young lady to whom he was greatly attached, and emigrated to America in May, 1842. The vessel was wrecked on Sable Island, and Pinkerton and his brid's were cast ashore there in a destitute condition. They there in a destitute condition. They made their way to the United States, and reached a small place called Dundee, near Elgin, Ill., where some Scotch families had settled. Young Pinkerton had lost everything in the shipwreck, but he pluckily went to work, established himself as a cooper, and soon succeeded in



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
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


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
