

Defending Officer: There is certain evidence which I believe is hearsay and I do not wish the telegram to be placed in the proceedings.

Court: You may merely make a statement as to whether enquiries have been made and as to whether or not they have been successful.

Prosecutor: An enquiry was made on the 27th of February, 1944, and information received is to the effect that no telegrams have been found -- no telegrams sent by the accused were found.

Questioned by the Court at the request of the Defending Officer.

Q. Did you receive any word from home since this case was adjourned?

A. I did sir. I received one yesterday afternoon and one in the forenoon.

Q. Tell us what difficulties there are, if any, at home.
