THE SEALFISHERY

All the ships are experiencing difficulty in picking up their remaining pans. Some fear they will lose several pans as the ice is breaking up and the pans drifting out of reach. Some of the ships are still jammed, but it is expected now with the present westerly winds they will all get clear. The Viking in the Gulf has only 300 on board, but the prospects are good. The estimated catch stowed down is as follows:—

It is reported that all duties will be removed from all essential supplies used in connection with the fisheries.

No. 3 slope at Bell Island will be opened this week, and 300 men will be taken on, who will be employed all through the summer.

About 200 laborers will be sent to the Humber from St. John's shortly. On the 15th the main dam will be opened, and this will give additional employment.
