## FELL OVER CLIFFS TO DEATH IN ANGRY WATERS BELOW

Tragic Fate of Harry Richards at Partridge Island Yesterday Afternoon—Had Been Working on a Building There—No Witnesses to Accident, But His Cap Was Seen Floating in the Water—Body Not Recovered.

Word reached the city last night that a young boy of fourteen, Harry Richards, had fallen over a cliff at Partridge Island and been drowned. Young Richards was the son of David L. Richards, well known in this city, and for a number of years light-house keeper on Partridge Island. Mr. Richards some time ago, however, gave up the position and the family have been living in different houses in the section of the city around Reed's Point. To the island on which he was brought up and on which he was a favorite with all, young Richards went back to meet his death. For some time he has been employed working on the new building which the marine and fisheries department are erecting there. About four o'clock yesterday afternoon Richards left his fellow work-

**HAVE SECURED A JURY FOR THE BROUWER TRIAL**  
TOMS RIVER, N. J., Oct. 8.—A jury was selected today for the trial of Dr. Frank Brouwer indicted for the murder of his wife. The prominence of Dr. Brouwer, who is one of the best known physicians in the country, and the wide publicity given to the case, made it difficult to find men acceptable to both sides and the opening session was taken up in choosing a jury the last man being accepted just before the court adjourned for the day.

## GERMANY MENACES

**BRITISH EMPIRE**  
Donald MacMaster, K. C., Former Canadian Lawyer, Thinks She Will Seize Colonies.

MONTREAL, Oct. 8.—The remarkable rise of the German Empire in the cultural people into an industrial nation is a matter of the gravest import in world politics, and there are those who see in it a serious menace to the integrity of the British Empire. Donald MacMaster, K. C., who arrived in Montreal yesterday from England, where he ran for parliament, is one of those who look with the greatest concern, if not with alarm, on the problems arising out of this industrial revolution. "Indeed," he said to an interviewer, "I think the time will certainly come when Germany will fight Great Britain for the possession of her colonies. 'Nobody will dispute the view that there is going to be a day when the struggle between the British people and the other industrial nations will be greater than now, and we must look forward to the day when British people in all parts of the world will have to stand together in sentiment, trade and defence. "Now, here is a startling fact, Germany is increasing at the rate of 800,000 to 1,000,000 people a year; that is shown by the census. They now number from 65,000,000 to 70,000,000 people. What are they going to be in 25 or 30 years? "We must look at this from an imperial point of view. We must look to the day when we shall be right up against Germany in hot competition not only in trade, but in national and physical force. Just listen to what a diplomat said about Germany the other day: 'Germany's strength rests precisely in the fact that an extraordinary increase in her population provides her with an almost inexhaustible military supply. "Germany will look abroad more than ever for a market for her goods, and as the markets of the world become shut up she will turn her attention to the British colonies, and will probably try to take them from England by force of arms, so that she can secure their markets for her trade. "You must remember that Germany is England's imitator, and that England won her colonies very largely by force of the sword."

## ON THE ST. LAWRENCE

**Many Improvements Still Being Made.**  
Energetic Work of the Department of Marine and Fisheries Under Hon. L. P. Brodeur.

QUEBEC, Oct. 8.—The Dominion marine and fisheries department have done great work during the season of navigation just drawing to a close, that will eventually prove very valuable to the shipping interests of the lower St. Lawrence river. Hon. L. P. Brodeur has done much to help the shipping interests at home and abroad. In the Straits of Belle Isle a new light-house and a fog alarm system have been installed with water connection, and at Port-au-Pas and Greenley Island similar works will be completed this fall and in operation next spring. A new light-house, waterworks and fog alarm system in course of erection at Belle Isle will also be finished this fall, likewise similar aids to navigation at Cape Ball and Cape Norman. At Cape Angich, Newfoundland, extensive works are being constructed, including a fog alarm system and keeper's dwelling, that will be finished next year. The new station at Cape Bay and the light-house systems at Cape Magdalen and Martin River are completed. Besides the foregoing the department will complete this fall a new fog alarm system at Seven Islands, and have erected four new lights along the Saguenay river. The Quebec agency is often handicapped for want of another boat and properly equipped workshops. There is a good supply of excellent mechanics, but the workshops are indifferent. That should be seen to. Owing to pressure of business the minister of marine and fisheries has been obliged to engage the services of the steamer Anamora to ply between Quebec and the works going on in the lower St. Lawrence. Tomorrow the Anamora is under orders to leave with several new concrete light houses that are to be placed in position at Matane and Metis, and next month will go down to bring up to Quebec the large staff of workmen on the important works all along the route as far as Newfoundland.

## BOUNDARY LINE IN LAKE ERIE.

International Waterways Commission Has Referred the Matter to a Canadian Sub-Committee.

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 8.—The Canadian section of the International Waterways Commission met here yesterday, George C. Gibbons, K. C., of London, the chairman, presiding. The question of an international boundary line in Lake Erie being one of the subjects for discussion. Two questions are now before the commission. The first is to try to agree where the boundary line is and the second whether it is practicable for the short distance where the fishing is most valuable to mark a boundary line with buoys. The matter has been referred to a sub-committee of the Canadian section, which will report upon it at a meeting of the commission to be held here on Tuesday morning next, at which Captain Dunn, of the Vigilant, has been asked to be present. The commission will meet in Chicago on October 15, to deal with the question of deepening and extending the Chicago drainage canal.
