Fredericton Tartars Will Challenge the St. Johns to Five Games for Money Stake—Late Baseball Games.

TARTARS AFTER THE ST. JOHNS.
The Fredericton Tartars are about to challenge the St. Johns to a series of five games for \$100 a side. The captain watched the series between St. Johns and Portlands with interest and when the outcome was assured, made up their minds to play the winners. The idea is to have two games here, and two in Fredericton, the fifth to be mutually agreed upon.

The Tartars expect Malloy and Dunphy to return again on next Thursday. This will strengthen their team fifty per cent, as it gives them a second pitcher, and allows Art Finnemore to go to centre field, a position which he plays in stellar fashion.

Should this series of games be pulled off, it will greatly boom baseball in the province.

THE BROWNS COMING.

When a State of Maine baseball team visits St. John to do battle with the local team there is generally something doing that will make the fans sit up and think. The Maine teams are usually thoroughly in touch with all the latest wrinkles in the game and they are always out to win. One of the best Maine teams is the Eastport Browns. They have defeated all the Maine teams they have met this season and in addition have the distinction of beating the St. Johns twice. Lately the St. Johns have been playing wonderful ball. In their last four games the team has made but four errors, a record which has never been equaled by a St. John team. Moreover, the St. Johns have proven that they are the fastest team in the maritime provinces as they have easily beaten all the provincial teams they have played.

It is announced that the Browns will be here on Thursday night to play two games with the St. Johns on Friday and Saturday afternoons on the Victoria grounds.

The games will certainly be two of the fastest ever seen in St. John, and it would be no surprise to see the Browns capture one of the games.

MULOCK'S REPORT ON CABLE CONFERENCE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—Mulock is expected to report fully to his colleagues respecting the Pacific cable conference on his return to Ottawa. In the meantime the government has received a detailed statement of the working of the cable for the past year. The number of messages and words transmitted during the year 1904 were approximately 171,988, and 2,058,952 respectively. Expenditure on the service of the cable during the twelve months ended March 31, 1905, amounted to \$50,751, against \$44,824 in the previous year. Total receipts amounted to \$27,449, 10c, (including special ed. of \$5,113 on account of repair service rendered by Irish, against \$20,118 last year. Surplus on actual working was, therefore, \$26,894. The board, however, set aside \$25,000 for renewal fund, and they had also to provide the sum of \$7,544 for interest and sinking funds. This sinking fund will extinguish in fifty years the entire capital expenditure. Adding these payments to the expenditure of the deficiency on the year's operations amounts to \$75,349, against \$57,751 in the previous year. This deficiency has to be made by the contributing governments.

Moore Wednesday afternoon at three o'clock, when their only daughter, Lottie Blanche, was united in marriage to Herbert Leonard Love of Love's river stables, King square. The bride looked charming in a beautiful dress of white silk, with veil and orange blossoms, and carried a shower bouquet of white roses and carnations. The bridesmaid, Miss Sadie Love, sister of the groom, wore biscuit colored voile, with wreath of roses and carried a large bouquet of flowers. Edward Moore, brother of the bride, supported the groom. The ceremony was performed in the presence of a large number of guests by the Rev. Mr. Hill. The presents received by the bride were beautiful and costly. Among them was a handsome oak dining room set from the parents of the contracting parties. After the ceremony a dainty dinner was served in the dining room of the hotel which was trimmed with flags and bunting, after which Mr. and Mrs. Love drove to the Union depot, where they left by the Boston train on their wedding tour. HAMPTON TRUSTEES TAKE ACTION.

The school trustees of Hampton Village met last night and accepted the plans which have been prepared for the proposed new school. The trustees are worried, however, by the recent action of the people of Hampton Station, who have twice turned down the proposal for consolidation. The Village trustees say that they are sick and tired of all this humping. They assert that they have been delayed for over a year in the building of their new school by the Station ratepayers, who do not seem to know their own minds. They will not be held up any longer, and are going to change, if the Station people finally come to a decision. The school trustees of St. John have been engaged as architects for the new school, and it was a set of plans prepared by him that was considered and approved by the Village trustees last evening. These plans are subject to a few minor alterations.
