HOMESTEAD REQULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land diffice for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements of that country. VICTORIA, B. C., April 3.—According to advices just received the volcano on Akutan, Island of the Aleutian archipelago off the Alaskan peninsula, after several years of inactivity is again in eruption. J. E. Thwaites, mail clerk on the steamship Dora, running from Unalaska to Valdez, send a brief but vivid description of the eruption, which occurred or was observed on February 22 and was accompanied by earthquake shocks.
