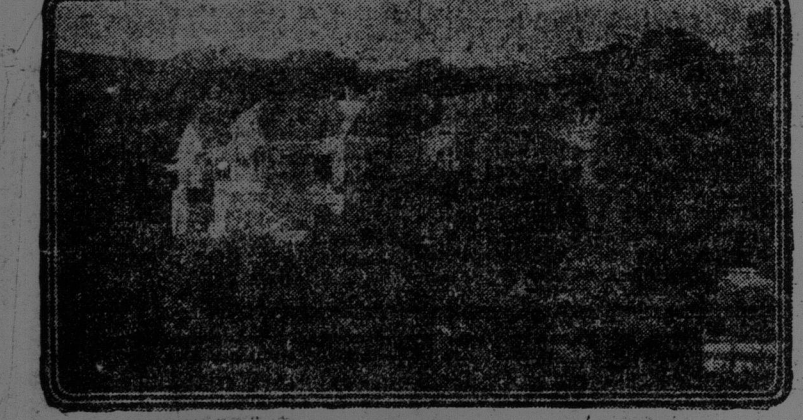

CANADA'S POLICY HAS AROUSED SOME INTEREST

Her Action in Opening Negotiations With Foreign Countries Discussed in England

MONTREAL, April 26.—A special London cable to the Star says: "The disclosure of Canada's negotiations with continental countries and Sir Richard Cartwright's confirmation have become the general subject of political discussion, especially in view of next week's conference debates on the preference. They are underlying the editorials in many of the London and provincial journals this morning. Sir Wilfrid Laurier today gave an interview to a reporter who handled the premier copies of the Times and Reuters' despatches from Ottawa. "Well," said Sir Wilfrid in his most mystical way "I thought," said the Star representative, "you might perhaps find it convenient to make a statement."

The premier replied with decided emphasis: "On this subject I have nothing to say." "Do you deny the accuracy of the statement?" he was asked. "No," replied the premier, "I do not deny, nor," he added after a pause, "do I confirm."

Then becoming the questioner he remarked: "May I ask where the Star obtained its information?" He was told: "From what we have reason to believe is a good source, Sir Wilfrid, and seeing its obvious public importance to this moment of imperial action or inaction I thought you might find it to serve Canada's best interests to make a statement." "Oh, no," he replied, "I have nothing to say, nothing." The representative had previously sought Sir Frederick Borden. He was asked: "What have you to say about it?" He replied: "Oh, nothing at all, it is not my business as a member of the House of Commons to say anything. You had better go and ask the premier."

GRADUATION RECITAL IN BEETHOVEN HALL SACKVILLE; LAST NIGHT.

SACKVILLE, April 26.—The graduation recital of Helen Gertrude Bower of Victoria, Carleton Co.; Bessie London, Canterbury station, pianist, and Helen Parker Watson of Woodstock, reader, was held in Beethoven Hall tonight, a large audience being present. The work of the young ladies was very excellent indeed, reflecting much credit on both students and teachers. Miss Bower showed herself to be a clever pianist, her special characteristics being temperament and repose. She was probably at her best in the La Pléiade, by Roff, which she played in a finished style.

Miss London possesses strength and breadth in a very marked degree. She did exceptionally well in bringing out melody in the selections rendered.

FREIGHT TRAIN DERAILED BY BROKEN BRAKE BEAM

PORTLAND, Me., April 26.—By the collapse of a brake beam on freight number 348 on the Boston & Maine, W. N. & P. division, leaving here at 10.55 and arriving at Cumberland Mills at 11.48 three cars were derailed, one plunging into a small stable and moving it six feet from its foundation. The broken brake beam dragged and cut the tie deep for a distance of a quarter of a mile. When near a spur track running to a coal-yard trestle the broken beam caused the car to jump the trestle so that it struck against the beam. No one was injured and only one of the cars was badly damaged.

DIRECTORS DISAVOW THE PROSPECTUS

The hearing of evidence was concluded yesterday afternoon in the equity suit of Michael Farrell v. James Manchester, R. C. Elkin and the Portland Rolling Mills, Limited. Counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. Michael Farrell, presented his arguments this morning. The plaintiff's case closed yesterday morning with the testimony of Arthur McDonald, local manager of the Bank of New Brunswick.

In the afternoon the defendants, Jas. Manchester and Robert C. Elkin, were examined and the defendants rested their case. Mr. Elkin was first called. He said that in June, 1903, he was manager and a director of the Portland Rolling Mills, engaged F. S. Sharpe to sell \$20,000 worth of Rolling Mills stock. Mr. Manchester, the president of the company, had, he said, approved of his hiring Mr. Sharpe. At Mr. Sharpe's request the witness gave him full access to the company's books and requested Eben Perkins, the superintendent, and Mr. McIntyre, the secretary, to aid Mr. Sharpe in every way within their power. Witness said that Mr. Sharpe had come to him with the prospectus before it went out, and asked him to look through it. He did so, and took objection to parts of it, especially that part where it was stated that the directors would increase their holdings, he having been under the impression that there was no express understanding that the directors were to increase their stock holdings. The paragraph which set out that the directors had taken up all the stock with the exception of "a small outside interest," he also objected to, for he recalled that the Baird estate held about \$15,000 in stock, equal to one-third of the company's paid-up capital.

The prospectus contained no statement of a dividend having been paid and he objected to it on that ground also. In the end saying to Mr. Sharpe that he would rather not have the prospectus issued. He raised the same objections to Eben Perkins, with whom he discussed the prospectus. Mr. Perkins, who was examined under commission in Chicago last fall, swore that the prospectus was put into his hands by Mr. Elkin, who approved of it in his (Perkins') presence. "Mrs. Elkin was not cross-examined by counsel for the plaintiff, and Mr. Manchester was called. Mr. Elkin, he said, was the only person that ever showed him the prospectus, and he had never given his approval of it. Neither had it been approved by the board of directors.

Mr. Perkins' evidence was to the effect that he personally handed the prospectus to Mr. Manchester, and that while the latter did not open and read it, he took it and retained it in his possession. Mr. Perkins, moreover, swore that Mr. Manchester had authorized him to write the letter signed by the company and accompanying the prospectus.

Mr. Manchester said that he had seen the letter. He had, he said, strongly protested against selling Rolling Mills stock at 70 cents, or at any figure below par. The board, however, resolved to sell it at 70, but the resolution was never carried into effect.

This closed the defendant's case. After Geo. V. McInerney, K. C., had cited authorities, at the request of the court, adjournment was taken until 10.30 this morning.

Mr. McDonald of the Bank of New Brunswick, was examined by G. V. McInerney, of the plaintiff's counsel and testified that in 1903 the Portland Rolling Mills Co. was indebted to the Bank of New Brunswick for about \$100,000, and there was an overdraft of \$45,000 included in this indebtedness.

BIG LABOR FUND TO DEFEND PRISONERS

Unions All Over the World Will be Asked to Contribute

NEW YORK, April 27.—According to the American this morning a big fund is to be raised by the Moyer-Haywood protest conference of the United States. Leaders of the movement aim to use the money in an endeavor to save the lives of the defendants. U. Solomon, a leader in the executive of the conference, issued the following statement today:

"Up to April 1, \$101,587 was raised in behalf of Moyer and Haywood, and \$22,000 of this money has already been spent by the Western Federation of Miners. In the next the sum of \$55,000 will be raised. The work of raising a gigantic defense fund for the Moyer-Haywood case will now begin in earnest. Not only will the labor unions of the United States be appealed to, but the labor unions of Canada, Europe and Australia as well."

Extracts from "The St. John City Assessment Law of 1898."
"Sec. 118. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the Real Estate, the Personal Estate, and the income of any person who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice, and as required by this Law, and shall make an estimate thereof, at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements within the time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 128. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the Assessors the statement, under oath, within the time hereinbefore required; nor shall the Common Council in any such case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."
