Annual meeting of lot holders in Fernhill Cemetery will be held in Board of Trade rooms Monday afternoon at 4 p. m. for the election of board of directors. Every lot holder has a vote.

The Mission Band of the Tabernacle Baptist Church will repeat their concert which was held in the vestry of the church, on Sunday at 4 p. m., in the audience room of the church. The programme has been revised and new selections added, among them solos by Eldon Morrish, the boy soloist. A silver collection will be taken.

Today was the coldest day in the month of April since 1883, when the temperature was 12 above the zero mark. The lowest registered this morning was 14 below, for the coldest it was 14 above. The winds are fresh to strong, but no gales have occurred so far this month.

In the country market today the following prices prevail: Veal, 9 to 10 cent; butchers' beef, 8 cents; country beef, 6 to 7 cents; eggs, per dozen, 18 cents; cream, per gallon, 25 cents; creamery butter, 37 to 38 cents; pound rolls, 23 to 24 cents; tub butter, 28 to 30 cents.

Eight burial permits were issued at the Board of Health offices during the week. Causes of death were as follows: Congestion of lungs, 2; asthma, 1; exposure, 1; apoplexy, 1; pneumonia, 1; oedema of lungs, 1; capillary bronchitis, 1.

The death occurred at Frankfort, Ont., yesterday of John Chapman, aged 82 years. Deceased has been postmaster at Frankfort for the last thirty years. Mrs. F. H. Jones, of this city, is a sister. Three sons and four daughters survive.

The schooner Constance which was towed into North Slip from Musquash where she had been on the rocks a few days ago, and which has been lying on her side for the past two days, has been righted and will be placed on the blocks to be repaired early next week.

The time ball on the custom house was hoisted for several hours yesterday afternoon while measurements of the tower were being made. The measurements were made in connection with some slight repairs soon to be made.

MILL DIDN'T START ON ACCOUNT OF WEATHER

Murray & Gregory are Likely to Stick to the Rate of Wages Given in 1906.

Murray & Gregory's mill which was to have begun sawing this morning did not start, owing to the unfavorable weather.

It is said that Messrs. Murray & Gregory will endeavor to start their mill at the same rate of wages as that paid in 1906, which is 10 per cent. lower than the rate paid last year. It is thought that there will be little difficulty so far as the spruce and of the mill is concerned but there is a strong probability that the shingle sawyers and bunched will stay.

EQUITY COURT.

In the Equity Court this morning before Justice Barker argument of counsel was heard in the case of George Harris on behalf of himself and others, of the Moncton Exhibition Association, vs. Fred W. Sumner and David L. Welch and other directors, F. Taylor and J. D. Hazen for the plaintiffs; M. G. Teed for the defendants.

Mr. Harris is seeking to set aside of the balance of the unused stock of the company amounting to 467 shares made by the directors of the company for about \$4,000. It consists of about 20 acres of land in the heart of Moncton and the new Government shops now are at the west of it and as a result the land has greatly increased in value so that it is estimated that it is worth from \$20,000 to \$75,000 by different witnesses. The defendants contend that the directors had power to sell this stock to Mr. Welch by virtue of the original stock subscription.
