CROWD BURROWING IN BEACH FOR KIDD COIN

Searching for Treasure Remains After
Mysterious Box Found in Cave.

SOMERS POINT, N. J., Feb. 6.—Diggers are honeycombing the sandy soil hereabouts today. After giving up all other work, they set out with picks and spades to search around in the earth for such buried treasure as may have been overlooked by the three black-browed strangers who burrowed into the estate of County Judge E. A. Higbee last Saturday night and got away (unless Captain Mark Doughty's eyes deceived him) with the long-sought money chest of Captain Kidd.

All the old legends that have interwoven themselves into local history have sprung into sudden, new life—stories of British men of war of Revolutionary days, that turned pirates when no one was looking and came snaking up the bay with the blood dripping off them to hide away ill-gotten gains till their officers could come and dig them out of the sands, and then crept away again guiltily, never to return; of pirate ships that put in here when they were sore harried on the open seas and hid away the money and jewels and plate that they had taken from helpless ships at the mouth of cannon; of hard-faced crews under the command of granite-browed captains that shoved their boats ashore here in an odd day—boats brimming with wealth that were tucked away in the sands for safe keeping at this handy point, while the pirate perused put off again, only to end their days flogging at the ends of men of war's yard arms, or at the bottom of the sea, leaving their loot corroding in the sands.

The Higbee estate last Saturday night wasn't removed to Pleasantville by wagon, but was put into a boat and taken to a vessel that was waiting with doused lights, somewhere in the darkness of the bay.

Mayor Campbell said this afternoon that it is quite likely that other treasure may be uncovered, since Somers Point 100 years ago was the seat of great activity, the abiding place of many wealthy seamen, a handy port of call for fleeing pirate ships, and a place, where, it is said, Captain Kidd himself often looked in for a quiet week of grog and flirtation before resuming his tours of bloodshed and pillage on the high seas.

Although the Canadian branch bank system may admit of opportunity for fraud on a large scale, it at least provides a guarantee against gross mismanagement of small institutions.

Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.
