TORONTO, Ont., July 31.—The executive council of the Dominion Alliance for the suppression of the liquor traffic, met here yesterday under the presidency of John R. Dougal, of Montreal. It was decided to seek amendments at next session of parliament extending the scope of the Scott Act to all provinces: to secure its better and all provinces; to secure its better forcement; to embark upon a pl signing campaign as an educati factor, and to help prohibitionist polf a full vote in all contests who vincial or national. "I expected Jeff to win inside of 10 rounds and I freely stated to my friends here that the fight would not surprise me if Jeff won in five rounds. If Fitz could win at all he would have to do it as decisively as he did when he beat Ruhlin and Sharkey before the
