H.A.D. TAKES UNFINISHED 2.20 PACE AT EASTERN MAINE MEET

3,000 People See Last Day's Racing--2.16 Race Goes to Little Johnny, Who Won in Straight Heats--American Chimes Easily Won 2.40 Pace--Heavy Wind Sweeps Park But Does Not Interfere With Speed of Horses.

Special to The Standard. Bangor, Me., Aug. 27.—Three thousand people saw the last day's racing at the eastern Maine state fair this afternoon. A heavy wind swept the park, but did not interfere with speed of the horses. In the 2.20 pace unfinished yesterday, H. A. D. took the fifth heat and race in 2.19 1/2, finishing strong and well in advance of Frank C. in a bunch close up with the Bangor mare.

In the 2.16-2.18 class the Lewiston stallion Little Johnny had speed to give away, and won handsily in straight heats, after the first had been declared dead between him and Attilius. American Chimes led them all around in the 2.40 pace, with Joan all around for second place, Joan of Arc and Nancy getting a season of second and third money.

TODAY'S LIST OF RACING AT WESTFIELD

Today promises to be a big one at Westfield, the final races in three series are to be sailed and some very close contests are anticipated.

At 3.15 p. m. the final race in the Class B. boat series will be started over the upper half of the club course, that is from the pavilion to the buoy or boat at Belyea's Point light and return to the pavilion. The race is sailed under handicap and the Louise allows the Clip II, 49 seconds, Rosamond 1 minute, 21 seconds, Keego 2 minutes, 54 seconds, Blackly 9 minutes, 30 seconds. In the two races of this series already sailed off the Louise captured one first and one third, the Clip II, one first and one second and the Rosamond one second and one third. Five minutes after the Class B. boats have started the gun will be fired for the start of the Special Named Race. LEARNED IS STILL KING TENNIS BEE

The 2.25 pace was won by Lady Simon, but a protest was lodged against her that at the recent mixed running and trotting meet at the park she made a mark of 2:15 1/2.
