Senator Jones and H. W. Schofield Returned Yesterday - Refused to Discuss the Result of their Trip.

Mr. Schofield, secretary of the Partington Pulp and Paper Company, when interviewed yesterday, said he could make no announcement until he had reported to his directors on the results of his mission on which Senator Jones and himself went to England had been successful, he said he would not make any statement till he met his directors.

TAKE STEPS TO PREVENT INFECTION

Department of Agriculture Declares War on Potato Canker. Diseased Tubers Brought to Canada Destroyed and Precaution Will be Taken to Avoid Spread of Malady.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, May 13.—The Canadian potato will be saved from the danger of canker, threatening from Europe, if the department of agriculture can save it. Potato canker is declared by departmental experts to be the most dread enemy of the tuber, being practically irradicable. It stays in the soil for years.

It is a fungus growth, and is very prevalent in continental Europe, and in England, where it has wrought havoc with the crops. The disease was recently discovered in Canada in an imported shipment of European potatoes, and the consignment was destroyed. Since then the regulations have been amended and circulars will be issued broadcast over the Dominion warning potato planters against the use of seed potatoes from Europe. In buying their seed potatoes they are required to obtain a certificate that the potatoes are not diseased, and have not been imported from Europe. The new regulations will be rigidly enforced.

ANTI-DUELLING RESOLUTION HAS BEEN ADOPTED

The Reichstag at Last Takes Definite Action to Suppress Ancient Practice Among German Troops.

Berlin, May 13.—The Reichstag today adopted the anti-duelling resolution introduced May 9 with an amendment drawn up by the Socialist members providing that officers who refuse to accept a challenge to a duel shall not be dismissed from the army. The resolution was initiated by the clerical party asked the imperial Chancellor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, to take steps to put an end to duelling in the army, particularly the practice making it compulsory for an offended person to challenge the offender or leave the army.

BATTLESHIP AND STEAMER COLLIDE, LATTER INJURED

Don Benito Forced to Signal for Assistance and Finally Had to Be Run Ashore.

London, May 13.—In a thick fog which came down suddenly over the English Channel, a serious collision occurred off Polkstone yesterday between the battleship London and the British steamship Don Benito, trading to Buenos Ayres. The battleship apparently undamaged, proceeded to Sheerness for examination, but assistance for the steamship had to be signalled to the Dover. Tugs proceeded to tow her in to harbor, but one of her holds was filled and she was run aground.

"CURED" LUNATIC SUFFERS RELAPSE, COMMITS SUICIDE

Mrs. R. S. Covert Returns from Asylum Apparently in Right Mind Then Shoots Herself Through Head.

Pembroke, May 13.—After having returned from Kingston asylum with her few days old child, two weeks ago, apparently cured of her insanity, Mrs. R. S. Covert, of Cobden, shot herself through the head Friday afternoon and died almost instantly. She was only 24 years old and the wife of a local contractor. The young woman was married a year ago. Some time ago she became insane and was taken to Kingston asylum. She was released, however, two weeks ago apparently cured and returned home. A nurse was born three weeks ago and the household seems to be in a normal condition. However, Friday the tragedy came.

SERIOUS FLOODS IN SASKATCHEWAN

Assiniboine River Overflows Banks and Covers a Great Area—Current is Now More Free.

Kamsack, Sask., May 11.—Owing to the continued rains of the past week the Assiniboine river half a mile south-west of this place, has overflowed its banks and reached the highest point for some years. Thousands of acres adjacent to the river are completely covered. The iron bridge across the Assiniboine at Port Polly was washed away by the flood, and some culverts on tributaries also were washed away. The traffic bridge, west of the town, is standing so far, but it is in a precarious condition. Citizens turned out and removed the flooring and stringers so as to leave as little surface presented to the water as possible.

CHANGES MADE IN ENGINEERING STAFF OF THE RAILWAY CO.

Hill, here for some time past will leave tomorrow for Woodstock where he will take up the duties of divisional engineer of that section of the railway. Brown of this city will take up the duties of divisional engineer of this district formerly held by Mr. Hill.

CELEBRATED EIGHTY-FIRST BIRTHDAY IN CAPITAL YESTERDAY

John Scott Hale and Hearty After Long and Useful Career—Veteran of the County Council.

Special to The Standard. Fredericton, May 13.—Hale and hearty, John Scott of this city is today celebrating his 81st birthday. Few men are better known throughout the length and breadth of York county than the "Godfather" of the county company, John Scott, who came to this country from Tyrone, Ireland, forty years ago he took a life partner and, of that issue there were 12 children. Most of his life has been spent at Barony, Kingsclear, where he lived until his removal to this city some four years ago. For 25 years he represented Humber at the county council, the longest period that any one member has ever sat at the council table.

BUM, POLICE DOG, MAY LOSE HIS JOB

New York, May 11.—Persons passing the police station in Madison street have noticed some of the city's protectors sitting with wrinkled brows and index fingers resting on their foreheads, and gazing unreluctantly at the strange sight. Gloomy suggestions of false clues in cases of murder, robbery and sudden death are all erroneous, however, for Bum, the mascot of the precinct, is the cause of the deep thought.

Bum is a bulldog, pride of the Madison street police, friend of all the children in the neighborhood and a terror to corner loungers and evildoers. Six winters ago he entered the station house, a hungry, tired and sorry dog. He was dusted off, bathed and fed. Then he tipped the scales at eleven pounds. Since that time Bum has accompanied policemen on post, given several fire warnings and gained a host of friends. He also has been growing fat. On Friday last, while assisting a policeman to disperse a band of rowdies at Cherry and Market streets, he got in front of a moving van. So handicapped was he by his extra weight that he could not move fast enough and the truck struck him. Bum was carried tenderly to the station and received such good treatment that yesterday he had fully recovered. But during the three days of idleness he added to his weight, which now is 48 pounds. It is a question of how to reduce Bum's bulk that is bothering the policemen.

ASSISTANCE FOR SHEEP RAISING IN THE DOMINION

Government Grant Will Be Provided and Distributed by Means of Various Societies—Better Stock Proposed.

A grant of money is to be made this summer toward the improvement of stock in British Columbia and in the Maritime Provinces. The money will be used by the Dominion Sheep Breeders' Association, acting with the co-operation of the Department of Agriculture, and arrangements for the expenditure will be completed this month.

RAISING FUNDS TO HELP CLERGY

Montreal, May 13.—The campaign to raise \$250,000 for the augmentation of the salaries of Anglican pastors in the diocese of Montreal, was opened today by Bishop Partridge. At midday a luncheon was held attended by many prominent church workers, at which it was announced that \$70,000 had already been promised. Tonight, while official figures had not been completed, it was stated that this sum had been considerably increased during the afternoon.
