THE SHOOTING OF H. J. MYSHALL

Fredericton, Oct. 17, 1912.
To the Editor of The Standard:
Sir: On Wednesday, Oct. 10th, just after dinner, I was accidentally shot by John Brewer, son of the proprietor of the boarding house where I reside. I had bought a box of steel shells at James S. Neill's hardware store that happened to be too small for the revolver chamber and which went in pretty well as they were rimless. When trying the shells I forgot one in the revolver chamber. Some time afterward John came into the room, and I showed him the revolver. He said that it was N. G. and that I could buy a much nicer one at a toy figure at a certain hardware store around the corner.

He picked up the revolver and was standing with his back to the window and facing me. He pulled the trigger around, neither one of us being aware that there was a cartridge in the chamber. It clicked around once, and John called my attention to the hair-spring, saying that it was weak and that it would soon get out of order, and as I bent over towards him to look at it, he pulled the trigger around again to confirm his assertion, and the overlooked cartridge exploded, hitting me in the shoulder.

The surprise and shock weakened me more than the pain at the moment. I told John to get a doctor as quickly as possible. From my room I staggered in to the dining room and told Mrs. Brewer that I was shot. Mrs. Brewer led me to a couch in the hall and rushed out to phone for a doctor. In the meantime someone came to my assistance and took off my collar and tie and opened my shirt. I was bleeding freely and was beginning to feel somewhat faint by this time. Mrs. Vanwart and McNally arrived soon afterwards. My left arm felt dead and lifeless, and I was weak and faint from loss of blood. Someone applied cold towels, to forehead and kept me from fainting. The bleeding stopped eventually and my strength was partially restored. I was taken to Dr. G. C. Vanwart, I am recovering rapidly.

To this report both John Brewer and I can swear if need be. In regard to John Brewer's report about my shooting myself, accidentally, would say that the boy was frightened and said that I shot myself. But some people saw too good a chance to create a sensation and start a scandal to let pass; consequently our came rumors of kind.

After hearing the report in regard to my committing suicide, I concluded that it was up to me to make a true report of the accident and refute the sensational ones.

A. McKechnie Says Rapidly Increasing Prosperity of Maritime Provinces Will Soon Bring Wandering Sons Home Again—Sees Bright Future for St. John.

A. McKechnie, of Vancouver, B. C., who has been recently appointed general manager of the Canadian Home Investment Company, arrived in the city yesterday on a visit of inspection. Since his appointment six weeks ago, he has been practically over the whole of Canada, visiting the company's offices. Mr. McKechnie is a son of the east who has done well in the western provinces, and is considered one of the most astute business men in Vancouver. Although he has been away from these parts since his boyhood days, his interest in the provinces by the sea is as keen as ever, and on this occasion of his first trip back since leaving here over 20 years ago, he finds wonderful strides have been made towards development. In fact, Mr. McKechnie said that his present trip has been a revelation. Crossing the continent one cannot but be impressed with the progress and advance which have marked the past few years. This is true of the east as well as of the west, and St. John, he thinks is taking no mean place among the progressives.

He spent several years in different parts of the states, but came back to Canada, as he expresses it, "to be among mine own." LIGHT SENTENCE FOR BOYS GUILTY OF CRIMINAL ASSAULT

Young Men Let Off With Fifteen Months and Fifteen Lashes for Assault on Hamilton Girl.

Hamilton, Oct. 18.—Justice Kelly this morning passed sentence upon the eight respectfully connected youths who pleaded guilty to indecent assault on Lena Holmes, aged 12. The assault occurred last summer on the Mountain.

Justice Kelly sentenced each prisoner to fifteen months in the central prison, with fifteen lashes, in passing sentence he said: "The charge upon which you were indicted by the grand jury is punishable by death or life imprisonment. The crown prosecutor thought fit to accept your plea of guilt to a minor, but nevertheless a serious offence. The laws of this country are made to punish those who break them. I am sorry to see that you are public to protect the public, to warn the public about breaking them. It is the duty of the court to protect the public."

Some of the boys who ranged from 14 to 18 years in age wept bitterly.

SHAH'S SON MENACES PERSIAN CAPITAL

Tehoran, Persia, Oct. 18.—The Persian capital is today menaced by a force of 80 horsemen under command of Reza-Ed-Dowleh, the young son of the reigning shah. He arrived close to the city today and it is believed the people sympathize with him. He is disatisfied with the present government. The national council is hastily collecting cannon and troops for the defence of the city.

MORE IMMIGRANTS CAME TO DOMINION SINCE LAST APRIL

273,649 Arrived During Last Six Months, Compared with 241,931 in the Same Period Last Year.

Ottawa, Oct. 18.—During the six months April 1st to October 1st, of the current fiscal year, 273,649 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of this number 133,990 arrived at ocean ports and 89,659 from the United States.

These figures show an increase of 13 per cent, as compared with the number of arrivals for the corresponding months of last fiscal year, which were 158,614 at ocean ports and 82,317 from the United States, making a total for the six months, April 1st to October 1st, 1911, of 241,931 persons.

During the month of September, 20,690 of them having been at ocean ports and 14,459 from the United States as against 21,077 for September last year, 17,583 of whom were at ocean ports and 11,484 from the United States.

Commissioner Waldo was not permitted to say whether Becker has requested a transfer from his post as head of the strong arm squad. The defence claims that Becker should be transferred fearing that he would be killed by gamblers for his zeal and that he did not relish the work. Jack Sullivan's account of the murder was dramatic.

"Where were you on the night of the murder—were you in the neighborhood of 42nd street and Broadway?" asked Mr. McIntyre.

"Did you go to Webster's place?" "Yes, about 2 o'clock. There were only two tables of poker players and I was looking for Sam Paul, so I went out and got a soda. This was five minutes to 2 o'clock. There was a big mob there, while I was drinking my soda and suddenly they all ran out. The boy at the fountain followed me. 'Here,' I shouted to the kid, 'come back here or somebody will steal your cash register.' He came back and I took my diamond pin out of my tie and put it in my pocket so it would not be stolen. Then I pushed my way to the Metropole, where I saw Rosenthal laying dead on the sidewalk."

Climax of Story.

"I leaned over Rosenthal and said, 'Herman, who did it?' but there was no answer. Herman was dead."

When Sullivan reached his place of his story he paused and looked around as if to note its effect. "Where did you go then?" resumed Mr. McIntyre.

"To the Cadillac Hotel, but I couldn't get in because of the crowd. I went back to Webster's, reaching there about 2:40 and saw Rose, Webster, Vallon and Schepps."

"Your Honor," said Mr. McIntyre, "I want to prove Vallon as an accomplice."

"No, no," Justice Goff said, "You can't do it this way."

"Do you know where Rose, Webster, Vallon and Schepps went after that?" continued Mr. McIntyre.

"Yes, I saw them at a cigar store about two feet from Webster's place. That was about 1:50 o'clock. Webster and I walked away from the others up Broadway and were talking about the murder."

Sullivan was not permitted to testify what Webster said to him.

"Did Vallon, Rose and Webster, together or separately, at any time ask you to swear, or to say that Lieut. Becker was in front of Webster's place with them while you were talking with them?"

"Yes," shouted Sullivan, before Mr. Moss could object. This answer was ordered stricken out.

Mr. McIntyre then addressed the court.

"I want to show by this witness," he said, "that Rose, Webster, Vallon and Schepps conspired to kill Rosenthal independently of Becker."

The attorney then asked Sullivan if any of the four men named had spoken to him about killing Rosenthal but Justice Goff refused to allow the witness to answer.
