CITY ASSESSMENT
COMMISSION REPORT
WAS DISCUSSED

Commissioners With Dr. Kier-
stead at Meeting Yesterday
Afternoon — Changes in
Certain Sections of Bill Sug-
gested—Matter Adjourned
for a Week.

The Common Council in committee,
yesterday afternoon, discussed the re-
port of the City Assessment Commis-
sion with Dr. Kierstead, and after
some suggestions had been made for
changes in certain sections of the bill,
further consideration of the matter
was adjourned until next Monday when
Dr. Kierstead will again be present.

Mayor Hayes also brought up the
application of the school board for in-
crease of \$50,000 in their assessment.
Mayor Hayes presided and Commis-
sioners Wigmore, McLellan, Russell
and Fisher with Dr. Kierstead were
present.

Considerable discussion took place
with regard to the allocation of the
amount received from the New Brun-
swick Power Co. The bill calls for a
tax of 4% per cent on the gross re-
venue and this to be divided as follows:
The real estate of the company in the
city to be valued and the amount
which would now be taxed on this ta-
ken from the whole amount paid and
the balance divided between the city
and county on the basis of track
mileage.

It was felt by the commissioners
that this was a fair distribution,
as all the gas sold by the company was
consumed in the city and the greater
part of the electricity, and it was fi-
nally decided to have this allocation
made by the assessment.

Mayor Hayes brought up the tax on
moving picture houses and suggested
that this be made a straight tax on
gross revenue.

Dr. Kierstead pointed out that the
commission was that houses only making
a small amount of net revenue should
not be taxed as heavily as those who
were making more money and while
the proposed system made a little more
bookkeeping for the assessors office
the commission felt that it was a fair-
er way of distributing the burden.

Commissioner McLellan referred to
the section of the bill which placed the
burden of caring for the hydrants on
the fire department. This should be
changed, as the hydrants belonged in
the water and sewerage department
and had been cared for by that depart-
ment for several years. They were
only taps placed on the streets for con-
venience and should be maintained by
the water department.

Commissioner Wigmore concurred.

**Synopsis of Canadian North-
west Land Regulations.**

The sole heir of a family, or any male over 18
years old, who was at the commencement of the
present war, and has since continued to be a British
subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country,
may homestead a quarter-section of available
Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or
Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at
Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for Dis-
trict. Entry by proxy may be made on certain
conditions. Duties—See notice residence upon
and cultivation of land in each of three years.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he
cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase
homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per
acre. Must reside six months in each of three
years, cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth
\$2000.

Homestead entries may claim time of employment
as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as resid-
ent during under certain conditions.
Where Dominion Lands are advertised or posted
by entry, returned soldiers who have served over
years and have been honorably discharged, receive
one day priority in applying for entry at local
Agent's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge
papers must be presented to Agent.
