Belyea Is Entered For Diamond Sculls

Citizens Committee Met Yesterday — Big Benefit Concert Tonight — Tag Day Postponed.

Hilton Belyea, St. John's rowing club, and the Maritime, Canadian and New England, single sculls champion, is to be entered in the English Henley Diamond Sculls race. His entry will be cable to the English rowing committee by J. C. Chasney today, so it was announced at a meeting of the Citizens' Committee to meet at the Commercial Club at five o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The hearts of all rowing enthusiasts in the city turn often to the Schuylkill river at Philadelphia these days, and all are hoping to see Hilton again show the American scullers his "piece of work." He has been invited to enter the "St. John" over the finishing line in the Amateur Sculling Championship of the World to be raced there June 8. If Hilton is successful in Philadelphia, his friends feel confident he will be equally so in the English classic for the Diamond Sculls.

At yesterday's meeting of the citizens' Committee, plans for the Belyea Tag day were discussed and it was decided to postpone further activity until the return to the city of Mrs. E. A. Marion Smith, who has given full charge of the Tag Day. Her wonderful success in supervising such events for patriotic or other worthy causes in the past, it is felt, will assure the success of the Belyea Tag Day. It is probable that the tag to be sold will bear a cut of Hilton and some appropriate slogan. The concert will be staged at the old Garrison City Hall tonight by the Royal Athletic Association, and Intermediate baseball champions of the city, was discussed also at yesterday's meeting and from reports received a bumper house is expected.

Promotor Rickard Waiting For Dempsey

Champion Will Be Asked to Fight Wills or Willard During July or September.

New York, May 17.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, homeward bound from Europe, will be offered an opportunity to fight for a title tomorrow if an arrangement can be made on the steamer here on Friday. He will be met, in all probability, by Promoter Tex Rickard and will be asked at once to meet either Harry Wills or Jess Willard. In case Dempsey declines, Rickard will set the champion to name an opponent whom he would take either on July 4 or Labor Day.

Rickard is desirous of staging another heavyweight title contest during the coming summer and while he is not prepared to bid as high for Dempsey as he did for the champion, he will offer \$10,000. Rumors concerning a fight between Rickard and the champion have been circulating for months.
