
THE ITALIAN SITUATION IS TO THE FRONT

(Continued from page 1.) "In West Galicia, near Ciezkowice, on the Biala, a Russian attack, made early on the morning of the 14th, failed.
"On the heights on both sides of Wysockie, on the Stry, strong Russian Wysockie, on the Stry, strong Russian forces attacked our positions, but were repulsed after severe fighting. In a counter-attack we captured an important height, taking three officers and 661 men prisoners.

"In the remainder of the Carpathians, except in some sectors, there were only artillery engagements.

"In Southeast Galicia and Bukowina no actions are reported."
