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**FOR THE DOMINION COMMISSIONERS.** Montreal, June 28.—The Salvation Army in Canada will have two commissioners on and after July 1, one for Eastern Canada, with headquarters at Toronto, and the other for Western Canada, with headquarters at Winnipeg. A statement to this effect was given out in Montreal tonight by Commissioner Leam of the Salvation Army headquarters staff at London, who is the Salvation Army international secretary for Canada. Commissioner Richards, at present commissioner for the whole Dominion, will remain at Toronto, in charge of Eastern Canada, which covers all territory east of Fort William, as well as Newfoundland and the Bermudas. For Western Canada a new territorial jurisdiction will be established, under Commissioner Charles Sowden, of the Salvation Army headquarters, London.
