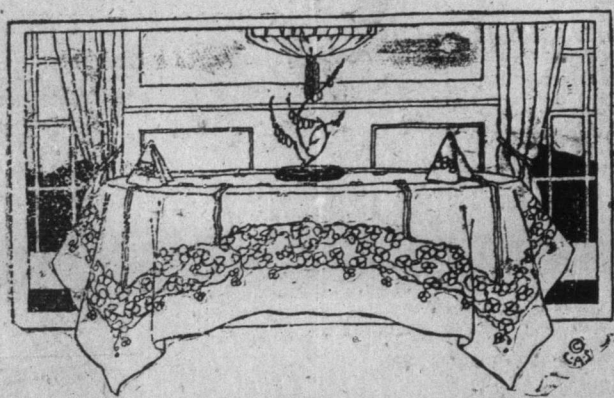

## CINCINNATI OUTPLAYED SOX IN FIFTH GAME OF SERIES

They Virtually Won World's Championship. Only Three Hits Off Ellor, which are widely scattered. Chicago Never Had a Chance.

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—Utter humiliation was Chicago's portion in the fifth world series game to-day, beaten 5-0, outclassed, virtually eliminated from the world series championship contention and revealed as a team unquestionably inferior to the Reds.

The White Sox departed for Cincinnati to-night to face to-morrow what is likely to be the final game of the big set. American League prestige has suffered, and the theory widely advanced prior to the series that the American League is fifty per cent stronger than the National has been exploded.

Right-handed "Ho" Ellor of the Cincinnati team established a world's pitching record and caused the White Sox to look like the weakest hitting team seen in the annual autumn classic in many seasons. A lot of schoolboys could scarcely have made a poorer showing at the bat than did the Sox against Ellor. Only three hits were made off his remarkable pitching, two of them by Weaver and even then more or less seriously.

The World's record was set in the second and third innings when Ellor struck out Gandil, Rieseberg and Schalk to retire the side in the second, and Williams, Leibold and Eddie Collins in the third. Thus did the top and the bottom of the hitting order succumb to the sparkling pitching of the Cincinnati ace.

Ellor has been the star of the Moran having corps this season, and Moran made bold to hold him in reserve until to-day, using other and less reliable pitchers for the preliminary games.

As if that were not enough, Ellor clinched his claim to fame by turning the pale hose back in the succeeding round on eight pitched balls. Another strike-out figured on the record in the fourth round ball-tossing.

Felch, swivelling indignantly on two sweeping curves and a fast ball. Weaver and the mighty Joe Jackson were also retired by Ellor who threw them out at first base on puny rollers.

In this respect, this respect was previously held by Claude Williams, the southpaw who was beaten by Ellor to-day, in the 1917 series, when Williams struck out the side, but five batters face him in that inning, that achievement is in fact to be compared with the brilliancy of Ellor's accomplishment.

Ray Schalk banished. Another quite unusual feature was the ejection from the game of Catcher Ray Schalk by Umpire Riger. Not since the memorable series of 1910, in which the Athletics beat the famous old Cubs, has a player been banished. Frank Chance, at that time the "peerless" leader of the Chicago Nationals, was put out of the game, and Jimmy Archer, the "Toronto" catcher, then sharing the backstop duties of the Cubs with Johnny Kling, finished at base first.

Williams again held the Reds to four hits, and had much better control of the ball than on the occasion of the four-to-two beating by Cincinnati. He really pitched a good enough game to beat most major league teams, but he couldn't win where his team mates couldn't score.

During the recent American League campaign the White Sox accumulated a team batting average of .292. Before the commencement of to-day's game their average in the series had survived to .211. To-night it is just a fraction over the .200 mark.

There never was a chance for the Sox in to-day's struggle. They were beaten at every turn, outfielded, out-hit and outplayed offensively and defensively all over the field. It was the first occasion during the series on which the Reds asserted indisputable superiority. Even with the 3 to 1 against them, it was felt that class would eventually tell.

Class told, all right; but it was some body else's class.

Show Concentration. There was again a demonstration of the concentration of attack which has been a feature of the Cincinnati play throughout the National League season and through out the present series. The Reds fully upheld their reputation as a "one big lining" team. They scored four runs on three hits in the eighth, and that was three runs more than were needed to beat the American League. They got another run in the ninth without the aid of a hit.

not as good as that of Ellor. The latter was first to bat, and swung feebly, as pitchers are wont to do, at the first two pitches. He took one ball, and hit at the next pitch, a low curve, which almost hit the plate. He "golfed" the ball high and far over Felch's head, pulling up at second base. Felch fielded the ball to the infield, and made a wild throw of it Ellor advancing to third on the mistake. Maurice Neale, the former Toronto third baseman, singled cleanly to right field, and the game, in the light of Chicago's subsequent failure to hit, was over. Daubert advanced Rath with a sacrifice, Groh walked, and Roush hit another such wallop as was delivered by Ellor.

The Sox outfield was playing in to cut off the runs at the plate, and Felch could not get back far enough to make a catch on Roush's drive. Felch managed to reach the ball and got both hands on it, but he was running away from the diamond at top speed and could not hold it. Both runners scored, and Roush also came home a moment later on Dun can's sacrifice fly.

Neale's Hit Scores Roush. The ninth inning run was unearned. Collins fumbled Roush's grounder, Duncan walked, Kopf sacrificed the runners along, and "Ookie" Neale scored Roush with an infield.

When Schalk was banished for questioning a decision by Riger at the plate, Lynn was sent behind the bat. Kynn is not a Schalk by any means, and when Eddie Murphy, formerly of the Orioles, batted for Williams in the eighth, Gleason was compelled to move to the mound. The change was not made because of any pitching weakness. In fact, Cioette was the only pitcher, to be removed in the course of five games because of ineffectiveness.

Moran used Adolpho Luque, the former "Leaf", but the Cuban was sent into the game because of the use of Sherwood Magee in the role of a pinch-hitter in the game in which Fischer started.

Cioette, Williams and Kerr seem to be the only dependable pitchers on the Chicago staff. On the other hand, Moran has resorted to the use of Ruether, Sallee, Ring, Fischer and Ellor, and to demonstrate that he has others, it is hinted that he will send Luque in to start to-morrow game in Cincinnati. If there is any respect whatever shown in which the Sox have shown the calibre displayed by the Reds it is in the back-stopping. Schalk, of course, is regarded as the game's premier catcher.

Both the Cincinnati and Chicago teams suffered a slump in their batting yesterday as a result of the great pitching duel, waged between Claude Williams, the star southpaw, and "Ho" Ellor, Moran's great right-hander. The former held the National League champions to four hits, while the American League representative gathered only three off the Cincinnati ace.

The teams are separated by 23 points, with the advantage in favor of the National League. Cincinnati is hitting for a team average of .213 compared with a mark of .190 by Chicago. Four men on the Moran aggregation are above the select 300 mark. They are Ruether with his perfect score of 1,000, Wingo and Fisher with 500, and Ellor with 333.

On the Sox aggregation four men are hitting in the select crowd, but none has a perfect average. McMullin leads with a mark of .500, while Joe Jackson, the mighty slugger of the Americans, is batting .316. Schalk has an average of .308, while Weaver is just under the wire with .300.

The National League team has made thirty hits in 141 times at bat, while its rival has gathered 29 in 153 times at bat.

The field yesterday was in excellent condition despite the rain of Sunday and 34,379 persons paid to witness the exhibition. The sun shone brightly and the temperature was to the liking of players and spectators alike.

With the Reds victorious in four of the games, Manager Moran of the series scheduled for Cincinnati to-day. Dick Kerr, it would seem, will be manager Gleason's choice.
