The Prussians and the Poles

Is there to be a new Kulturkampf in Germany? asks "Rome." One can never be too sure of anything these days. Here in Italy until a few months ago it did seem as if the Italian Government were anxious to spare trouble, as far as possible under difficult circumstances, to the Holy See; since then we have seen it act in tacit connivance with the lowest elements of anti-clericalism.

In truth the policy is not a new one. Twenty-five years ago the Landtag voted a credit of one hundred million marks to be spent in purchasing estates held by Poles and colonizing them with Germans.

Prussia has already spent five hundred million marks to Germanize Prussian Poland, but it has had its labor for its pains. Nay, it would seem as if Providence and Polish vitality had begun to Polonize Germany for while Prussian Poland is as Polish as ever, the persecuted people are increasing throughout Prussia, and there are no fewer than two hundred thousand of them in the Rhineland provinces.
