

And the Question being put on the Amendment:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Then the main Question, so amended, being put;

*Ordered*, That the Bill be now re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House, with power to add to the second sub-section of the first section of the Bill the words, "or any Municipal corporations interested in the matter in which such Railway Company has made default, may sue therefor in any Court of competent jurisdiction, one half the penalty to belong to the Crown, and the other half to the corporation suing for the same."

The House accordingly again resolved itself into the Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. *Haggart* reported, That the Committee had amended the Bill.

*Ordered*, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be now taken into consideration.

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration.

*Ordered*, That the Bill be now read the third time.

The Bill was accordingly read the third time.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered*, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Senate, and desire their concurrence.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill to amend "The Liquor License Act, 1883;"

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

*Resolved*, That this House do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. *Ives* reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill and made amendments thereunto.

*Ordered*, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be now taken into consideration.

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration.

*Ordered*, That the Bill be read the third time To-morrow.

Mr. *White (Renfrew)* reported from the Committee of Supply, several Resolutions; which were read, as follow:—

1. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding Ten thousand and fifty dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray the following expenses in connection with the Department of the Interior, viz: Further amount required for Departmental Printing, \$10,000; Additional amount required for the caretaker of the Geological Museum, \$50, for the year ending 30th June, 1885.

2. *Resolved*, That sum not exceeding Six hundred dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray the following expenses in connection with the Department of Indian Affairs, viz; Statutory annual increase of salary to four recently appointed probationary Third Class Clerks, \$200; To provide for the salary of a Clerk to be appointed, \$400, for the year ending 30th June, 1885.

3. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding Six hundred and twenty-five dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray the following expenses in connection with the Inland Revenue Department, viz.: To provide for increase and promotions (subject to the Civil Service Act as to promotion examination) under new theoretical organization, which, though estimated for 1883-84, has not yet been carried into effect. The Estimates for 1884-85 have been based upon actual pay-list, irrespective of such re-organization: *G. R. Hall*, promotion to First Class, \$250; *N. Stewart*, promotion, Third to Second Class, \$100; *W. Himsforth*, as Chief Clerk of Correspondence, \$175; *John Byrne*, \$100, for the year ending 30th June, 1885.
