ASK FEDERAL GOV'T
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one year is \$1,400. This comes from three sources: summer earnings, scholarships bursaries and loans, and family assistance. "A student would have to earn \$475 a month during the 4 1/2 months to pay all his expenses. Yet only one in four earn \$275 a month," he said. He added that the average summer saving comes to \$500.

Scholarships bursaries, and loans contribute about eight per cent towards the cost of attendance. "About six out of 10 students receive an average of \$550 plus room and board from their parents," Rawson said. The national average for family contribution comes to \$700. However, he declared, three out of every four children can expect no assistance.
