# CARNIVAL PASSES ON SALE THURSDAY

Rising Winter Carnival fever takes another jump with Carnival passes going on sale Thursday in the Student Centre. These passes cover all admission to all Carnival events. As in the past years, only 2,000 passes will be sold owing to building limitations and fire laws. They are expected to be sold out in two days.

Passes will be sold from the ticket window in the Brunswickan office from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Thursday, Friday and Monday. Taking into account the fact that there are close to 2,200 students on campus and only 2,000 Carnival passes, it is necessary to restrict the number of passes to two per person for Thursday only.
