The losses by fire in the United States and Canada The losses by Are in the Chited States and Canada during the month of February, as compiled by the New York Journal of Commerce, aggregated \$13,081,-250, a decrease of \$5,662,050 from February of last year, when the figures were \$21,744,200, and a decrease of \$6,979,950 from the record of January this The losses of the first two months of 1915 reach a total of \$33,141,850, a reduction of over 25 per ent. from the record of \$44,948,900 for the first two months of 1914. There were some 275 fires reported during February this year, which in each instance caused a property damage of \$10,000 or over.
