ANTHRAX IN BRITAIN.

Sir John McFadyen's latest report on the state of the country with respect to contagious diseases is only moderately satisfactory, remarks the Scottish Farmer. . . . The returns regarding anthrax do not make pleasant reading. Up to October 23rd, the figures for the present year are 1,071 outbreaks, with 1,405 animals attacked. This is the largest number of outbreaks recorded in a like period since the disease was scheduled. The obscurity in which the whole question of anthrax is enshrouded, makes it extremely difficult to form any adequate theory of explanation.

SHIRES, SHORTHORNS AND LINCOLNS.

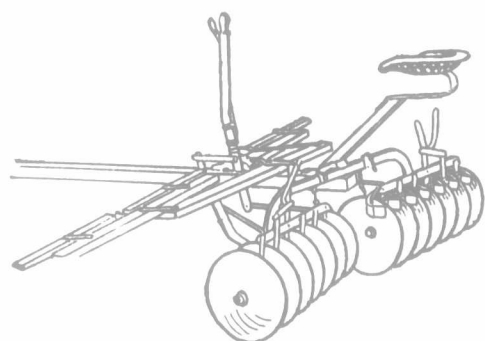
That the breeding of Shire horses, Shorthorn cattle and Lincoln sheep has been reduced to a science on the splendid stock farm of John Gardhouse & Sons, Highfield, Ont., is demonstrated by the marked improvement noticeable in the quality of their studs, herds and flocks year by year. Tuttlebrook Girl is another brown two-year-old, a right big, good filly, on a splendid bottom. Tuttlebrook Girl is a brown yearling, an immense big colt, of grand draft character. Others on hand are Holden's Nicaeus (imp.), a brown five-year-old, exceedingly thick and smooth, and finished with a faultless bottom; a high-class show mare. Black Beauty is a black yearling daughter of hers, sired by Admiral Togo. The type and quality of this great filly is best proven by the fact that she was first at Toronto and London this fall, and at every county show where she appeared. She is a wonder of perfection. Then there are several others, including two very choice yearlings. Any of these mentioned are for sale. The stallion in service is the renowned champion, Royal King 3rd (imp.), a stallion whose high-class type, quality and character leaves no doubt of his right to the term of Canadian Shire champion. The high-class character of this noted herd of imported and home-bred Scotch Shorthorns is too well known to need any touting, representing practically all the Scotch blood of world-wide fame; the herd for years, in the show-ring and out of it, has held its own against all comers. Few herds now in existence have produced more prizewinners, or been headed by so many prizewinning sires as this. The chief stock bull now in service is that immensely thick-fleshed bull, Imp. Prince of Archers, a Cruickshank Butterfly, a bull beef to the hocks, and handling like a glove. He is proving a sire of the kind that leaves a name behind. Other young bulls are one roan yearling, out of Imp. Eliza; one red yearling, a Miss Ramsden, and one white yearling, a Broadhocks, all sired by Prince of Archers; herd-headers every one of them; remarkably straight and even; a choice red nine-months' Crimson Flower-bred son of Archer's First. This will make a show bull of a high order. In heifers, there are a number from nine months up to two years, bred in the purple, and of show-ring form. All the Lincolns that can be spared are sold.
