The Committee are of opinion the complaints of the petitioners of Quebec and Montreal, of an insufficient Police in their respective Cities are well founded, and that it may be expedient a Bill be introduced into the House to be carried through to a Law, granting more efficient powers to the Magistrates of Quebec, Montreal and Three Rivers, to establish and carry into execution such regulations as may be by them judged necessary for these places respectively; and in order to meet so much of the prayer of the petitions from L'Assomption and William Henry as relates to Police, as well as similar wants which may be experienced by other parishes, towns or villages throughout the Province, these regulations may be extended to all towns and villages where the inhabited houses shall amount to a certain number upon the majority of the householders requesting the same.

And they are further of opinion, that several of the other objects of the petitions are provided for in the different Bills now depending before the Legislature, and the residue of them do not appear to your

Committee to be matter fit for immediate confideration.

Mr. Young, from the Committee to whom was referred the petition from fundry inhabitants of Quebec, under the name of the Benevolent Society; reported that the Committe had examined the same, with the diast of a Bill prepared by the petitioners; agreeable to the prayer of their petition, and the Act of Farliament of Great Britain referred to as the example from which they come forward to the Legislature for relief from the inconveniencies they represent their Society to lay under and that he was directed by the Committee to report their opinion, thereon to the House; and he read the report in his place, and afterwards delivered the same in at the table, where it was again read once throughout by the clerk.

Which report is as followeth::-

The Committee are of opinion; that from the evident utility of Friendly or Benevolent focieties in providing relief for the Members thereof in old age, fickness and distress, and the experience of the good resulting from them in Great Britain, which has procured to them the countenance and protection of Parliament, it is desirable that the prayer of the petitioners be granted; by a Bill being brought in to be carried through to a Law, granting such societies, generally, the legal means of fecuring their funds for the uses thereof, and to make necessary requilations for their internal order and the management of their concerns, upon similar principles to those established for friendly societies in Great Britain by the Acts of the British Parliament, varying these only where the local circumstances of the Province may require.

Ordered, that the foregoing reports do lie upon the table.

On motion of Mr. De Salaberry, seconded by Mr. De Benne,

The House adjourned till to-morrow at twelve o'clock at noon.
