Ordered, That Mr. Hutchinfon, Mr. Robie, and Mr. Lawfon, be a Committee acordingly.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow at twelve of the clock.

PRAYERS.

A meffage from the Council by Mr Cogfwell :

Mr. Speaker,

The Council requeft a conference, by committee, with a committee of the Houfe, refpecting the fupplies neceffary to be granted this Seffion for the fupport of His Majefty's Government, and the general fervice of the Province.

And then the Meffenger withdrew.

The House proceeded to take the foregoing mellage from the Council, into confideration; and thereupon,

Refolved, That the following meffage be fent to his Majefty's Council, by the Clerk of this Houfe, viz.

The Houfe of Affembly having already granted all the Supplies which they deem neceffary for the fupport of His Majefty's Government and the general fervice of the Province, cannot confent to hold a conference by committee with a committee of His Majefty's Council on that fubject; but the Houfe will very readily hold a conference by committee with a committee of His Majefty's Council on the general ftate of the Province, and requeft fuch conference accordingly.

A meffage from the Council by Mr. Cogfwell :

Mr. Speaker,

The Council agree to the conference as defired by this Houfe, immediately, in the committee room of the Council.

And then the meffenger withdrew.

Ordered, That Mr. Hutchinson, Mr. Haliburton, and Mr. Robie, do manage the faid conference.

And they went to the conference.

And being returned.

Mr. Hutchinson reported that the managers had been at the conference, and flated the subflance of the conference to the House.

On motion of Mr. Hutchinfon, refolved, that a Committee be appointed to wait upon his Honor the Prefident, to inform his Honor—that the Houfe of Affembly have ufed their utmost endeavors, during a long Seffion, to complete the important bufine's of the Province, and having finished the Appropriation Bill, to which his Majefty's Council had agreed, and which, after having been submitted to his Honor for his perusal, had been returned, in the usual manner, to the Speaker of the Houfe, without any intimation whatever that any part of the faid Bill was exceptionable—The House fully expected that, agreeably to the usual practice in the Province on the preferatation of that Bill for his Honor's affent, as the last Act of the Sellion, the same would have been agreed to by his Honor, and that the General Affembly would have been prorogued—That his Honor having been pleafed to refuse his affent to the faid
