

# MORE RIOTS IN DUBLIN ARE EXPECTED BY THE POLICE

### Strike of the Street Car Men Only an Incident in the Disturbance Which is Alleged to be Due to the Passions Aroused by the Home Rule Bill.

DUBLIN, Sept. 3.—There was no further rioting as the result of the street car strike yesterday, but the situation is still critical and further bloodshed may ensue at any time.

Jim Larkin, the leader of the street car strike, is a picturesque agitator, with a long, lanky figure, drooping moustache and a regular "Wild West" personality.

He seems to have met his match, however, in W. W. Murphy, the capitalist boss of Dublin, a man of 70, with a hard face and fighting eyes. He has declared publicly that he is out to fight what he calls "Larkinism," and refuses to leave his house in the southern suburbs of Dublin, which is guarded day and night by the police. Murphy is also the owner of the Imperial Hotel, from the balcony of which Larkin made his defiant speech yesterday afternoon.

All the elements of a labor dispute in a Western American city are to be seen in the present trouble. It is a battle of personalities, which involves riots and reprisals. Before the rioting on Sunday night the people were not inclined to sympathize with the strikers, but after the savage baton charges made by the police last night there was a strong revulsion of feeling and the sentiment is now against the constables.

# KEIR HARDIE IS HORRIFIED

### Action of Authorities in Dublin Direct Attack Upon Trade Unionism.

DUBLIN, Ireland, Sept. 3.—James Keir Hardie, the Socialist member of parliament, who is here in connection with the street car strike riots and the conflicts between the strikers and the police, said today:

"I regard what has happened here as the most serious event the trade union movement has had to face for at least a century. The action of the authorities against the strikers, James Larkin, and others sweeps aside the whole of the trade union constitution and restores us to the exact position in which the trades unions were before they were legalized."

"It is a form of action against trade unionism which is very common in America, but I did not expect to see it in any law-abiding country like our own that the anarchist precedent of the United States courts would have been followed."

Mr. Keir Hardie went on to declare that apart from the merits of the dispute, the action of the authorities was so alarming that it must be checked at all costs.

The employers of Dublin are considering the proclamation of a general lockout.

# PEARL ROBBERS CAUGHT IN LONDON

### Five Men Accused of Theft of the Famous \$675,000 Necklace.

LONDON, Sept. 3.—Five men were arrested here yesterday for the theft of the famous \$675,000 pearl necklace, which was shipped by registered mail from Paris to a jeweler named Myers of this city some time ago, and for which the police of other cities have been searching for several days. The men were arrested in Bow Street Court, where four of them were charged with having stolen the necklace, and the other was detained as a witness.

Some of the pearls were recovered. Scotland Yard after a hopeless hunt for the pearls for some time, returned to the police from 4 Highton Gardens, and by following this up they made the haul of the five men yesterday. One of the prisoners, a jeweler, of Highton Gardens, named Joseph Gizard, was captured at his place of business. Three other men, named Gutterworth, Lockwood, and Gutterworth, were caught near the British Museum station. After having been tracked by the detectives for some time, resisted arrest and gave the police a hand fight before they were subdued.

The prisoners were searched, and a number of the pearls which composed the necklace were found on one of the prisoners. As officially given out, the necklace was worth \$685,000, but Mr. Myers, the owner, and Mr. Salomon, his Paris agent, who shipped the necklace, placed the value at as high as \$750,000. It was insured for \$675,000. The police refuse to state the value of the pearls which were recovered, but they say they have not the slightest clue to the balance of them.

The police are reticent in regard to the details, but there is little doubt that the necklace was stolen in London after the parcel had been delivered at its destination in Hattog Gardens.

# Horrible Confessions of Greeks

Letters Captured Show Greek Soldiers Were Barbarians.

A Score of Prisoners captured by Only One Man.

(Canadian Press Despatch) SOFIA, Bulgaria, Aug. 18.—(ed Correspondence.) In order to that Greek soldiers were responsible for a number of atrocities against Bulgarians in the fighting last June between Bulgaria and her former ally, Greece, in Macedonia, the Greek government has been made public in Sofia several letters written by Greek soldiers and officers to friends at home. The letters were captured in a mail of the 10th regiment of the 7th division by Bulgarian troops in the vicinity of Kavlovo. They have been given out by the Bulgarian newspaper in pamphlet form. Each letter is printed in facsimile of the original Greek followed by a translation in French, which gives the date and the names signed to each communication.

The first letter in the pamphlet dated July 1st and the last July 7th, are taken from some of these communications of Greek soldiers and officers to their families. They have been abandoned by the Bulgarians, burned the Greek villages and Bulgarian villages. They massacred the Greek and the Manlicher created against every member of the nation, who has fallen into our hands. Out of 1,200 prisoners we took at Nigritia, only 100 remained in prison and everywhere we went we have left no trace of life.

Another letter from a sergeant says: "We burned the two villages (Doubli and Bani zza) and put to death the mayor of the village. We did this without pity and without making exception only of our children and old people and the women. We did this without pity and without grace."

A third letter, dated Nigritia, July 12 says: "Here at Nigritia we captured five Bulgarians, and we shot them. The Greek army is burning the Bulgarians also. While they were still alive we cut their eyes." This letter is signed Costi.

Another Greek soldier named Zhis Beglikis writes to his mother in the following words: "The Greek army is burning the Bulgarians all those which it takes; things are happening which is impossible to express. God where this business will end. A very brief extract is given the letter Nico Theophilatos to Demeter Chr Tsagaridis at M under date of July 11.

Nico writes: "They gave me prisoners to take to the division quarters, and I started to march. The others were lost in the darkness by myself."

This last letter bears the seal of the 10th regiment.

**Legal Action To Stop Burns!**

LONDON, Sept. 4.—The Press against the sale of the manuscript of Robert Burns which is to be auctioned to an American collector at Liverpool Athenaeum several days ago for \$25,000 has taken definite action to restrain transfer of the manuscript to America. The surviving granddaughters of Robert Burns, the poet's nearest of kin, have declared executors of the poet's confirmed personal estate of the poet's consent of the great grandson of Robert Burns.
