Brant Boys Write Home From Hospital

The following letters are from Bert Meates, who left with Captain Macs company, and who is well known throughout the city. Bert wants a "smoke" pretty badly, and it is to be hoped that the first Courier tobacco box is there by this time. He got his box of chocolate alright, the kiddies are being blessed for it.

Dear Brother—Just a few lines to let you know that I received your letter and photo a few days ago. Was very pleased to see you looking so well. I am keeping well myself and I hope you are all the same, mother and Harry included. I wish you would tell Harry that I have not received the tobacco yet. There might be such a thing as that it went down with the Lusitania when she was sunk, for I have not got it yet. We are having some dandy weather here now, it is like summer. I have moved from the Am. column now. I am with the first brigade transport, so you will have to change my address to First Brigade Headquarters Staff, 44108, 1st Canadian Division, B.E.F.

How are things going in the working line. I guess things are pretty slack now, but they ought to be picking up now. The Germans are still going around where we are to-day, a piece of shrapnel just dropped about ten feet from me. Lizzie did not get one of the last photos for I am sending this one that I had for my self. I do not know whether you got one or not, but mention in your next letter whether you did or not. Will you kindly send it on to Lizzie. Well I will close this now and write some in another letter, with best wishes from your loving brother B. J. MEATES.

Well, Dick, I am going to write you some more, so as to keep you reading for a little while. I am with P. Small, now on the transport. I would like you to send me some tobacco as soon as that money gets over there. Never mind the expense. I must have some McDonald chewing tobacco, for I am lost without it. I just got a box of chocolate from the kiddies of Brantford. The stuff laid in Salisbury since Christmas, but all the boys that are alive will get one. They are a very dainty little box with six pieces of Cowie's chocolate. To-day is the 24th of May, and believe me we do not need any fireworks. I wish you would remember me to all of the boys. I have just been on this job about two weeks. I was in the big fight after it came through all right. I guess I will close now. B. MEATES.

PTE. A. PROUSE. Pte. A. Prouse sends a short note to say that he is in hospital with a nervous breakdown, but does not state where. It is evidently a Canadian hospital, for he states that the doctors and nurses are Canadian, and that, as any boy from home would say, "makes it better."

Dear Mother and Sister—Have arrived safe at the hospital, with a nervous breakdown, a piece of shrapnel wounded my arm, but otherwise I feel alright and am getting along nicely. We certainly have nice nurses and doctors here, and what makes it better, they are Canadians. I have been in the trenches for three days, and I certainly have seen some awful sights, but I guess the Germans have seen just as bad if not worse. I lost a couple of chums along beside me by a big smoke box dropping alongside them in the trench and nothing was left. The night before, our artillery certainly did play havoc with the Germans. Well, mother, I guess this is all I have to say for this time, hoping there will be a big change in the war; also it won't last much longer, as Italy has gone in it. I guess I will close, hoping this will find you all well, from your loving son, ARTHUR.

TREMENDOUS MAJORITY FAVORS CHURCH UNION

General Assembly, 368 to 74, Sends Question to the People.

KINGSTON, June 9.—By the unprecedented vote of 368 to 74 the Presbyterian General Assembly agreed yesterday afternoon to send the question of Church union to the congregations and Presbyteries.

Many predicted a smaller vote for union than last year, but the returns as compared with those of the last Assembly show a large gain for Church union. The best vote secured at last year's Assembly against union was 29 per cent, this year the anti got only 16 1/2 per cent. of the Assembly on their side.

When the Moderator put the question: "All in favor of the amendment?" the ranks of the anti were thin and scattered, and were easily counted by the Clerks. When those against the amendment arose it was impossible to count them, and the Senior Clerk asked that the Commissioners should raise five rows at a time. Phalanx after phalanx of unionists stood up till all were counted.
