They are 20½ inches high and were executed by Pierre Harache in 1699. Their weight

The bottles probably belonged to the first Earl of Egmont, who obtained a charter to colonize the province of Georgia and who was appointed president of the province. The last owner, though unnamed, was a titled woman. Pilgrim bottles are extremely rare and these two are regarded as very fine specimens. It is surmised very fine specimens. It is surmised that the purchaser, Crichton, acted as the agent of a museum.
