Reception to Mr. C. R. McIntosh

On Friday evening last the members of St. Paul's congregation and Sabbath school, with other friends, gathered in the basement of the church to bid farewell to Mr. C. R. McIntosh, who has resigned the principality of the Athens model school to accept a similar position in Perth. An interesting impromptu programme was rendered and refreshments served. During the evening an address was read to Mr. McIntosh by the minister of the congregation. Mr. McIntosh in reply to the address made a fine speech, setting forth the principles according to which he had tried to conduct his work and expressing his thanks for the good wishes and kind words of the address.

The address was as follows:—

Mr. C. R. McIntosh.
Dear Friend,—The occasion that calls us together this evening is one to which there are many parallels in life. Again and again we find ourselves called to say farewell to friends and fellow-workers. These changes and partings cannot but give rise to feelings akin to sadness, yet we shall do well to remember the words of a great poet and wise man, "Rejoice that man is hurled from change to change unceasingly. His soul's wings never fail."

It is not to much to say that during your six years' stay in Athens the village has benefited very materially by your works. Several generations of pupils will in days to come rise up and call you blessed. We have all admired your originality and independence, your dislike of mere seeming at the expense of being, your enthusiasm and unfaltering fidelity to your ideas. We must also mark the fact that you have been able to control your pupils without recourse to physical force, your discipline having been of that higher type which results from what may be described as power of personality. We are thankful too that as Principal of the Model and Public school you have consistently endeavored to instill the principles of Canadianism, to school your pupils in patriotism, and to fit them in mind and feeling and temper to be good citizens of our fair Dominion. It is our sincere opinion that from all the most important points in view your work as a teacher in Athens must be regarded as an unqualified success.

There is another feature of your life amongst us to which we must now refer. As members and adherents of the Church which you yourself belong, we desire to put upon record our appreciation of your kind and faithful Christian service. As a Bible Class Teacher and teacher of other classes you have been zealous and efficient. You have tried to be true to the past, as the past is pictured in the pages of Scripture, and yet true also to present needs; you have felt great reverence for the inspiration vouchsafed to men of old and yet mindful of the inspiration that may come to men to-day. Again, as a member of the Church you have been faithful and diligent. You have been present at nearly all our sessions of worship, an intelligent and sympathetic hearer. Your habits of life before the world have been clean and honorable so that no one has been discouraged or perplexed or made ashamed by reason of your example. In a word, we would say that your connection with our beloved Church and St. Paul's congregation has been entirely honorable to yourself and helpful to all who have been associated with you.

Finally we pray that the Divine blessing may go with you in your new and larger field of work. We are glad that though you are leaving us you will not be lost to the Church or to Canada. We congratulate you on having taken what seems to us a step forward. It is to your credit, that to many other good qualities you join that of healthy enterprise and praiseworthy ambition. You are not content to be one of those "ebbing men" as Shakespeare calls them, who "do so near the bottom run, By their own fear or sloth," and we rejoice that such is the temper of your mind.

Let us inscribe as a parting word these expressions of Scripture which very truly represent our feelings:
The Lord watch between thee and us.
The Lord bless thee and keep thee:
The Lord make His face to shine upon thee, and be gracious unto thee:
The Lord lift up His countenance upon thee and give thee peace.

IN THE KING'S NAME

The refusal of several citizens of Athens to assist the Chief in taking a prisoner to the lock-up on Saturday caused that officer to go to Brockville on Monday to arrange for a judicial demonstration that the majesty of the law has to be upheld by all good citizens when called upon in the king's name to do so. His visit to the county town is thus reported:—

Recorder: Constable George Brown of Athens was in town to-day attempting to secure summonses against six or seven prominent residents of the village whom he claims refused to assist him in making an arrest on Saturday morning. At the time of going to press, Brown had not succeeded in his mission, as the magistrate was otherwise engaged.

Times: The Chief of Police of the village of Athens was in town this morning and while here informed some person that he was here for the purpose of getting process issued against some half-dozen residents of Athens, charging them with having refused to assist him in making an arrest in that village recently. Some of the persons named by him as having refused to assist him are law abiding and law respecting citizens of the most unimpeachable integrity and good moral standing in that community where they have spent their lives. As yet the officer's search for a summons here has been unsuccessful.
