KICKED TO DEATH WHILE IN JAIL

Prisoner is Victim of Maniac, and Two Others Are Seriously Hurt

Seattle, June 30 .- N. Marcott, 23 years old, a prisoner held in the re-Johnson, aged 29, a fellow prisoner, and seriously injured two others. Johnson, a journeyman butcher, came

He found Marcott standing over Johnson, whose face had been crushed in by Marcott's kicks Marcott was locked in a padded cell, and the injured men were removed to the hospital on another floor of the city hall. Johnson died 10 minutes after he was
