So far as the Observer is able to learn practically all the former councillors will offer for re-election, yet it is stated that Coun. Morgan of Brighton will not again be a candidate. It is said his aspirations are for the greater honor of a seat in the Legislature, since there is likely to be a contest for the seat made vacant by the death of G. L. White. The names of Frank Hagerman, Woodford Craig, Ransford Birmingham, Henry Tedlie and W. D. Keith are mentioned as possible candidates and with this assortment to pick and choose from the electors of Brighton should have no difficulty in selecting a likely representative.
