portation for anyone who can show that employment or maintenance can be obtained elsewhere within the province, and will make cash advances to responsible parties so as to tide them over the difficult season or till employment can be obtained.

These measures will help, if they do not fully meet all the requirements, and shows that the government is endeavoring to cope with an exceedingly difficult situation.

Your committee recommends that arrangements be made to secure the preferred loan at once, and that immediate steps be taken to start the necessary work to employ all the idle and needy men as soon as possible. Committee—

The report of the committee was received and filed, after which Ald. Busby moved the following resolution, seconded by Ald. Crossen:

Whereas the government of British Columbia has signified its willingness to advance to the Corporation of the City of Nanaimo, the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, for the purpose of providing work for men now out of employment, on condition that the Municipal Council provides security satisfactory to the said government, equal to the amount proposed to be advanced, and

Whereas the Municipal Council has on hand an issue of sewer debentures of this city, unsold, amounting to \$30,000.00,

Be it Therefore Resolved, that of the said sewer bonds, \$10,000.00 be deposited in the Canadian Bank of Commerce in this city, to the order of the government of British Columbia, as security for the sum advanced by the government of British Columbia, and that such said loan shall be repaid to the said government upon the said issue of debentures being sold.

During the discussion which took place on the motion it was pointed out that the city had a large amount of pipe on hand and that fully 85 per cent. of the \$10,000 would be paid out in wages alone.

### Election of School Trustees

Public Notice is hereby given to the Electors of the Municipality of Nanaimo, that I require the presence of said electors at the City Police Court House on the 11th day of January, 1915, from 12 noon to 2 p.m., for the purpose of electing three (3) persons as members of the Board of Trustees for Nanaimo City School District.

Any person being a British subject of the full age of twenty-one years, and having been for the six months next preceding the date of nomination the registered owner in the Land Registry Office, of land or real property in the City School District of the assessed value of the last Municipal Assessment Roll of five hundred dollars or more over and above any registered judgment or charge, and being otherwise qualified to vote at an election of School Trustees in the said School District shall be eligible to be elected or to serve as a School Trustee in such School District.

The mode of nomination of candidates shall be as follows:

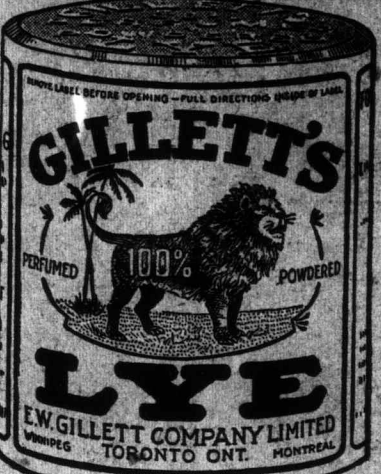
The candidates shall be nominated in writing, the writing shall be subscribed by two voters of the Municipality as proposer and seconder and shall be delivered to the Returning Officer at any time between the date of the notice and 2 p.m. of the day of the nomination and in the event of a poll being necessary, such poll will be opened on the 14th day of January, 1915, at the City Police Court, at 9 a.m., to 7 p.m., at which time and place each elector who is duly qualified to vote for Mayor will be entitled to his vote for three (3) candidates for members of the Board of School Trustees, but may only cast one vote for any such candidate, of which every person is hereby required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

### BRITISH VICTORY IN EAST AFRICA

Nairobi, Jan. 4.—British East Africa via London, Jan. 4.—The British battleship Goliath and the light cruiser Fox have carried out successful operations against Dar-es-Salaam, capital of German East Africa. The warships bombarded the town, inflicting considerable damage. All the German vessels in the harbor were disabled. Fourteen Europeans and twenty natives were taken prisoners.

The British loss was one killed and twelve wounded.

Dar-es-Salaam, the best-built town on the coast of German East Africa, is a military station with an excellent harbor situated forty miles south of Zanzibar. It is the terminus of an important caravan route, the residence of a governor, and has large commercial interests. The white population in 1909 was estimated at 1,000; the total population at more than 20,000.

### TRADE IN BASEBALL

New York, Jan. 4.—The New York Nationals today secured the services of Hans Lobert, third baseman of the Philadelphia Nationals, as the result of a trade consummated in Philadelphia.

In exchange for Lobert the Philadelphia Club will receive a cash consideration and the following players: Aldemare, pitcher; Milton Stock, third baseman; and Jack Adams, a pitcher. This announcement was made tonight by Manager McGraw of the New York Nationals.

### THE KING'S NEW YEAR HONOR LIST

London, Jan. 3.—The New Year's honor list contains no new names. The Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and formerly governor-general of Canada, is raised to the rank of Marquess and Viscount St. Aldwyn (Michael Hicks Beach) is elevated to an earldom.

The Order of the Garter is conferred on the Earl of Derby and the Earl of Chesterfield, while the order of the thistle is bestowed on Baron Lovat.

Arthur Henderson, labor leader and member of parliament for the Barnard Castle division of Durham, is appointed a privy councillor. Hamar Greenwood, Liberal member of parliament for Sunderland is among the three new baronets, while sixteen persons receive the honor of knighthood. Among those knighted are Hon. John Newbold, barrister and author and Frank Watson Dyson, astronomer royal since 1910.

George Balsey Perley and Clifford Stilton of Canada, were appointed knights commander of St. Michael and St. George.

London, Dec. 31.—His Majesty has been pleased to give directions for the following promotions and appointments, the list including eight Canadians, two of whom have been honored with a K. C. M. G. and four with K. B., thus taking the prefix "Sir."

To be Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George: Hon. George Perley, acting high commissioner for Canada.

Hon. Clifford Stilton, K. C. M. G., Wilfred Collet, C. M. G., governor and commander in chief of British Honduras.

George Basil Hadden Smith, C. M. G., governor and commander in chief of the Windward Islands.

To be Knight Bachelor: Hon. Francois Xavier Lemieux, acting chief justice of the superior court of the province of Quebec, and Herbert S. Holt, of Montreal, president of the Royal Bank.

### EXCHANGING PRISONERS

London, Jan. 5.—A despatch to the Daily Chronicle from Berlin by way of Amsterdam, says the first exchange of wounded prisoners of war will take place in Geneva this month.

### EXCLUDED FROM CANADIAN MAILS

Vancouver, Jan. 4.—Official notice was received from Ottawa today that the German press, published in Seattle, is to be excluded from the Canadian mails. Fearing that it might be held up this paper has been sent by the publishers into Vancouver, disguised in all kinds of odd wrappers but the postal authorities have detected most of the parcels. It had an agency here on Carroll street. In future anyone found in Vancouver with a copy of this paper in his possession is liable to a fine of \$2,000.

### RELIEF FOR MINERS

Letbridge, Jan. 4.—The provincial government is to furnish relief to miners in the towns of the Crow's Nest Pass where the mines have been closed almost the entire season.

### RAILWAY IN OPERATION

Brussels, via The Hague and London, Jan. 4.—The Germans have placed the entire Belgian railway system in operation and are employing about 8,000 railroad men, of whom 1,100 are Bavarians. Many of these men have just been brought into Belgium.

## "Lest We Forget"

WE need to be reminded quite as much as to be informed. Memory has been jocularly described as "the thing we forget with." Out of sight is apt to be out of mind.

An advertiser who relies on the memory of the public leans on a broken reed. The absence of its advertising from the newspaper has been the beginning of the end for many a firm. "The present suitor hath ever the advantage over the absent lover."

A business that has achieved its magnitude or strength as the result of faithful advertising plays itself false if it suspends or ceases its advertising, on the grounds of economy. It is poor business vision which fails to see the principal feeder of business, and fatal judgment which cuts it off or interrupts its flow. Economies may be warranted, but they had better be effected in any other department than in sales department—the department of revenue. Any course which shoves your customer back from you or hides you from your customer is ruinous. The man with the money needs to be constantly sought. Advertising is the great discoverer of new customers, the great retainer of old ones.

If you forget the public, the public will forget you.
