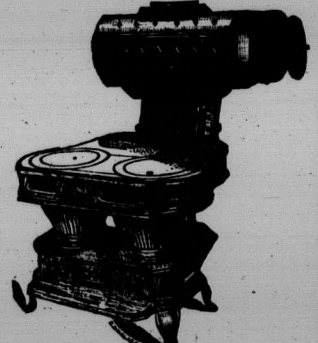

Historical. - The old bell that

will lately summoned the children of

the Church to worship at the R. C.

Chapel, Cape Bald, has quite an

interesting history. It was probably

the first church bell ever brought into

this county, if not into this part of

the country. It was imported by the

late Father Gagnon, in 1807, for the
