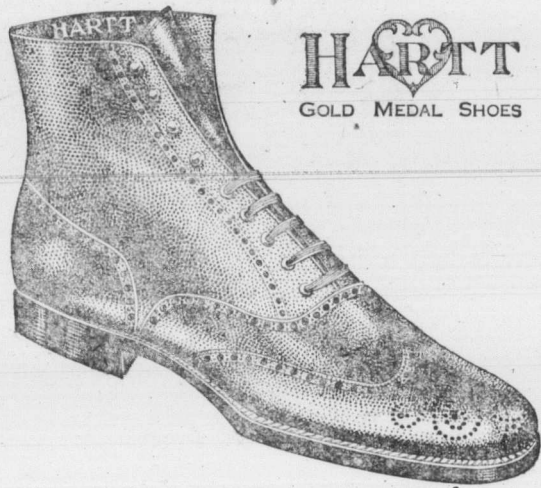

KENTUCKY MINERS RETURN TO WORK

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 1.—Five thousand miners on strike in western Kentucky were instructed to return to work Monday by union officials following the reaching of an agreement yesterday on a wage increase for the miners by a committee representing miners and operators.

All monthly men were given an increase of \$1.50 a day and drivers \$1.75 per day, retroactive to August 16, 1920.

SUGAR FROM JAVA

St. John, N. B., Oct. 1.—It is announced here that the steamer P. West Vaca is on the way here from Java with 4,000 tons of raw sugar for the Atlantic sugar refineries, the first time for sugar from Java to be brought to this port. She left Java on September 3rd.

THE MUSTER ROLL

"The same—a staunch man and true. So faithfully was he faithful—even to slaying—that when the army of the righteous dispersed, he did not lay aside his zeal with his belt. He took to business as a matter of course, and in his house was planned the famous Rye-house plot, in which so many good men were involved."

"It has now come to pass, however, that Monmouth, who has long lived in exile with the regicide of Westworth, has at last turned him to higher things, and has consented to make a bid for the crown. It was found that the Scots preferred to follow a chieftain of their own, and it has therefore been determined that Argyle—Monmouth—more as the breeches say, of Inverary, shall command a separate expedition, landing upon the western coast of Scotland, where he hopes to raise five thousand Campbells, and to be joined by all the

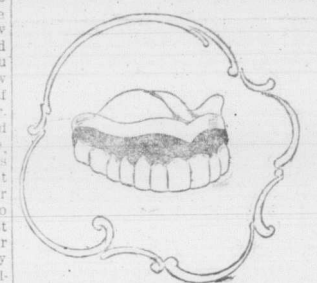
