The announcement has been made of the appointment of Dr. P. F. Duffy as surgeon of the marine hospital, Douglastown. The contest was narrowed down to Dr. Duffy, Dr. Byrne, of Chatham and Dr. Desmond, of Newcastle and was pretty warm.

A few mornings ago while at breakfast the guests of the Robertson House, Bathurst, were astonished to see two deer grazing in front of the hotel. Being disturbed they ran to the garden of Mr. Ellis, where they stayed for some time. They eventually ran to the river and swam across the harbor to the village. Game is very plentiful on the North Shore.

Complaints are again made by our Point La Gade subscribers that they do not receive their papers regularly. We understand the fault lies with the mail clerks on the other side who are said to be so overworked that they haven't time to sort the newspaper mail for Point La Gade people and toss it aside. Our subscribers are naturally rather indignant about it and some favor asking the postal department for an investigation.

A number of papers have stated that the man who fell from the Ocean Limited near New Mills last week was one Charles McKinnon of Chatham. His name is not McKinnon but McCarthy as stated in the last issue of "Events" and he does not belong to Chatham but to Boston. He was one of a gang of laborers brought to this country a year ago by Thomas Malcolm to work on the International railway. Reports from the hospital this week say McCarthy is doing splendidly and that there is every probability that he will shortly be out. When he is liberated it is understood he will be charged with stealing a ride on the I. C. R. train.

Matters in the dispute between the I. C. R. machinists and the management are now virtually settled, so the members of the I. A. of M. who have been active in connection with the concessions asked for stated at Moncton Monday night. Representatives from the northern division of machinists were there on that day in session with Master Mechanic Lozo of River du Loup, and Mechanical Superintendent Joughins, and the men left for home at night satisfied with the interview. It is stated they have been granted an increase of two and four cents, and a settlement of the wage question on this basis gives the North Shore men perfect satisfaction.

On the main line of the I. C. R. some of the old conductors made their last run yesterday. The pension act's provisions state that all the employees over the age limit must relinquish their positions on the 31st of July. All employees over 60 years of age who have been in the service fifteen years have the right to retire on pension and those who are 70 years of age are forced to retire. Three in all, at least, on this division will likely receive pensions. These are old familiar faces, Levesque, conductor on the Maritime between Campbellton and Lewis, Geo. Cagnon brakeman on the Maritime between Campbellton and Lewis and Car. Inspector John Gallant. Under the act no pension is less than \$20 a month.

Two meetings of the Town Council were held during the past week, the first on Friday evening and the latter on Tuesday evening. Friday evening's session was devoted to the consideration of by-laws, the council going into committee of the whole. By-law No. 4 relating to the duties of Committees, was reported favorably for adoption. At Tuesday evening's meeting a communication was read from J. C. Mackintosh & Co., Halifax, asking for information re-valuation, population, debt, etc. of the town. The matter was referred to the Finance Com. A request from Arch'd McNair for relief from payment of taxes for this year as he has been given a license to do business to Oct. 31st 1907. Referred to Assessment Com. D. Cameron made application for license to conduct a moving picture show for three months. On motion it was ordered that license be issued on payment of \$75.00. After passing a few accounts the Council went into committee of the whole to consider by-laws, Coun. Mowat in the chair. A number of the new by-laws were reported favorably for adoption, after which council adjourned.

Donald Myles of Dee Side caught a salmon at Brandy Brook, last week, weighing fifty three pounds. This is the largest salmon on record.

Elaborate preparations are being made for the big political picnic at Carleton on Tuesday. It is expected that several hundred will go from Campbellton.

Geo. Furlotte, a prominent farmer residing at Broadlands, Bonaventure Co., took a crew of six to St. Anne's on Friday and sold some of it to the Indians. On Saturday he was fined \$50 and costs.

The second of the series of moon light excursions on the steamer Lady Eileen took place, Monday evening. It proved to be as enjoyable as the first. The night was fair and the music by the band was excellent.

The ladies of Christ Church were to have held a garden party last week but were unable to get a fine day. So they held a social entertainment in Dimock's hall instead. The affair came off Thursday evening and was well attended.

David Russell of Montreal has sold his two St. John newspapers, the Telegraph and Times to John McKane, a wealthy Miramichi lumberman who is said to have political aspirations. The Telegraph and Times will it is said give an independent support to the Conservative party.
