Hawaii's Show Volcano, Kilauea, the spur of the great Mauna Loa, is a well-beloved volcano, as it can be visited with perfect safety, even if in eruption—as it is from time to time—when exhibitions of activity are given that are worth traveling thousands of miles to witness. This volcano is in no respect a hazardous trip that can be made to it from Honolulu covers four days. This allows only half a day at the volcano, which is much too short a time to study the workings of what is considered one of the world's wonders. A week at least should be given to the trip. The sea voyage is always more or less rough, but the boats, although small, are comfortable. From Hilo, where the water trips end, there is a railroad ride of about eighteen miles through the big Ohae stage plantation. This is followed by a stage run of eleven miles over a road leading through a perfect fairyland of tropical foliage, the highway being lined on either side with roses, magnolias and ferns, which last grow to the size of trees without losing any of their delicate beauty. Returning by the other route, there is a stage drive of thirty-five miles over lava roads and across the great flow which ran into the sea from Mauna Loa several years ago.

SCHOOL OF BUMBLEBOM.

Complete Catechism's Special Advice for Certain Ambitious Bits of Humanity. Guardians of the poor are the last class to receive a dig in London Truth's catechism. The following is supposed to be of assistance to them in no respect. Question.—Who are you? Answer.—A Guardian of the Poor. Q.—What is a Guardian of the Poor? A.—A representative elected by the Ratepayers to guard the poor and needy—or, as I prefer to designate them, "paupers"—from the misfortunes incident to their position. Q.—From what misfortunes do you chiefly guard them? A.—From the misfortune of impairing their digestion by too much eating and drinking, and of becoming proud by the enjoyment of excessive independence. Q.—Have you other interests to guard besides those of the poor and needy? A.—Yes; I have to guard the interests of the Ratepayers who elect me. Q.—Do you discharge this duty with fidelity? A.—With unwavering fidelity. Q.—Quote me an instance in proof. A.—I will—e. g., I rigorously scrutinize every farthing that it is proposed to expend on the maintenance of the paupers, and if such expenditure appears to go beyond the bare necessities of their existence I denounce it in no measured terms as picking the Ratepayer's pocket. Q.—What is a Board Room? A.—The official chamber where we Guardians of the Poor hold our fortnightly meetings. Q.—How is it furnished? A.—With a Turkish carpet, a mahogany table and chairs upholstered in the choicest morocco. Q.—With whose money is the said furniture purchased? A.—With the money of the Ratepayer. Q.—What are Workhouse and Workhouse Schools? A.—Places where paupers and the children of paupers are lodged and fed, and to which we Guardians pay periodical visits of inspection—to see that they are efficiently and economically conducted. Q.—Describe to me one of these visits of inspection. A.—I drive to my destination in a wagonette with several of my colleagues. We take a little light refreshment at a neighboring hotel preparatory to the labors of the inspection, which we return to at least half an hour. Then we return to the hotel and recuperate our exhausted frames with a sumptuous luncheon, three or four whiskeys-and-sodas and shilling cigars, after which we play billiards, partake of further refreshment, and then drive home in the cool of the evening, conscious of having spent a long and arduous day in promoting the welfare of our poorer brethren.
