WEDNESDAY, Oct. 8. PRODUCE. The market has shown increasing activity preva The market has shown increasing activity prevalent during the week, wherever anything was offered for sale; but offerings have continued to be made sparingly in nearly all cases save that of fall wheat, and of it all offered has been wanted. Ext citement has been the rule everywhere, and prices were rushing up rapidly on flour and wheat until to-day, when a pause seemed to have set in. The approximate quantity of grain on passage for the United Kingdom for orders, expected to arrive during the four weeks from Sept. 18 to Oct. 16, is: -Wheat, 301,000 quarters, comprising 18,000 quarters from the Danube and Black Sea; 86,000 Rye... quarters from Atlantic ports; 97,000 quarters from California, and 100,000 quarters from Chili and Wheat, fall, new, per bush..... Australia Continental advices by mail of the Wheat, spring, 22nd ult., state that in the northern and northwestern parts of France the wheat crop was estimated as being 30 per cent, below an average. Supplies were scanty and prices were firm, with an advance in 7 and a fall in 16 out of 89 markets whence reports had been received. Rye also was very firm, owing to the deficiency of the new crop. Barley, however, was quiet. Oats tend downwards, under the influence of good supplies and a good home crop. In the ports foreign wheat was held for an advance, red winter at Havre being scantily offered at 49s 9d per 480 lbs.; for October-December the same price was asked. The quantity of American wheat on passage to France by sailers, up to latest postal dates, is 426,800 qrs. At Marseilles stocks at the docks were down to 70,000 qrs. Belgian markets were firm, and at Antwerp advanced prices were quoted in spite of large imports. In Germany "term" markets were firm and improving for both wheat and rye, but at the close part of the advance was lost. At Berlin a material improvement tool also had been improving, and closed firm. At Ham burg spot wheat was firm with a good local demand. New wheat of fine quality seemed to be very scarce. Saale barley was quiet, but firm in price for choice qualities, some being taken at 52s 6d to 53s 6d per quarter. At Danzig wheat was firm, with fine old mixed quoted at 48s 0d to 49s 0d per quarter. German crops were turning out, in the aggregate, the best in Europe. At Vienna, wheat on the 4th ult. was firmer and prices for delivery advanced; and at Pesth also the tendency was upwards.
