An American Siberia.

One hundred and sixty State convicts were killed the other day in an explosion at the Banner Coal Mines, in Alabama, U. S. A. Doubtless their deaths came as a merciful release, for these poor fellows, all negroes, were practically slaves, doomed to toil all their lives underground. "An American Siberia" it has been termed by the one man bold enough to write about it. The convicts are nearly all "lifers," and so, by the laws of the State of Alabama, they have ceased to have any civil rights whatever. Anybody can kill them with impunity, and as a matter of fact scores of them are flogged and tortured to death every year. Those that do not die a certain quantity of fixed work each day are not allowed to come to the surface at night. There are convicts in the Alabama coal mines who have not seen the light of day for years. They are, in fact, buried alive. Others are chained to wheelbarrows. When, in 1891, the free white colliers of Tennessee rose against the employment of convicts in the coal mines there, they found underground, and brought to the surface, men who had gone stone blind through being shut up so long in darkness. One man had not seen the light of the sun for eleven years, and had been chained to a wheelbarrow for three years. Another convict was found who had toiled as a slave underground for forty years. His offence was the theft of a mule worth a few pounds.—P. V.

Pencils and Diphtheria

In the United States the pencil danger has long been recognised, and in all the schools the utmost precautions are taken to prevent the interchange of both pencils and paint brushes. But stern methods are necessary. The very first lesson every child should be taught is not to put a pencil in its mouth. If it was known that the severest punishment would follow pencil sucking, the habit could be rooted out promptly. It is practically impossible for any teacher, however vigilant, to prevent children borrowing each other's pencils, but it ought not to be a very difficult task to see that the little ones keep their pencils and paint brushes out of their mouths. Train Was Enveloped in Flames

Three Lives Lost, Eight Persons Missing, and Fifty Injured in Wreck on Penna Road. Easton, Pa., April 30.—Three persons lost their lives, eight are missing and believed to be dead, and half a hundred others were injured on Saturday afternoon at Martin's Creek. N. J., in a wreck of an excursion train carrying 170 school children and friends from Utica and Syracuse, N. Y., and vicinity, to Washington for a week's outing. The train was one furnished the teachers by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad and the accident occurred while it was travelling at a high rate of speed over a stretch of track controlled by the Pennsylvania Railroad. The locomotive jumped the track, the cars toppled over and were set on fire by exploding oil, the wrecked coaches having side-swiped an oil tank along the track when they left the rails. The entire train was quickly enveloped in flames and completely consumed by the fire. The eight missing persons, seven of whom were women, and lived in Utica, are believed to have been burned to death in the wreck. The finding of charred bones led the railroad wrecking crews to the conclusion that they are dead.

Gold in Chicken's Claw

Woman's Discovery Led to Finding of Deposit in Arizona. Phoenix, Ariz., May 1.—A nugget in the claw of a chicken killed for a Sunday dinner was the start of Cochran as a locality possessing rich placer ground. The discoverer was Mrs. Bud Wilson, who followed the chicken tracks around her home until at last she found where the gold came from in an arroyo only one hundred yards away. About forty mining claims have now been staked out around Cochran, which is a station on the Phoenix and Eastern Railroad, a few miles beyond Florence. Mrs. Wilson and her husband own most of the claims staked out. Not only have nuggets been found in considerable quantity, but gold and copper have been found in ledges almost beside the railway track.

Who Breaks the Law?

For crying newspapers on a Sunday, a boy was recently summoned at Chester, under the Lord's Day Act of 1874, and a conviction was obtained. Afterwards, the boy brought an action against the constable for the illegal seizure of his papers, and won his case, with one shilling damages. As a matter of fact, there are still at least four Acts of an earlier date than 1700 in force regulating the Sabbath. One dates from 1448, and forbids people to hold fairs on Sunday. Another, passed in the reign of Charles I., forbids people meeting out of their own parishes for common plays or unlawful sports. So recently as 1897 proceedings were taken under this Act, but unsuccessfully. Then there is a law—still un repealed—of the time of Charles II., which enacts that every person shall go to church on Sunday, or pay a fine of five shillings. Many ancient statutes have been repealed during recent years, but there still remains the Act of Edward III. to prevent an idle son of annoying his mother. A9nd by an Act of good Queen Bess's days it is illegal for women to wear false hips or other beauty aids.—Answers.

Goat Farm.

How Ten Pounds Produced £400 a Year. On the Surrey Downs close by Guildford, there is a farm which its owner, Mr. A.W. Sheppee, claims to be the only goat farm in England. There the herd of milk goats, each with a bell about its neck, browse over the heaths and Mr. Sheppee has built up a trade in goats and their milk which shows in a striking manner the possibilities of the "poor man's cow" to the small holder. Mr. Sheppee came to England from South Africa with his wife and four children only two and a half years ago. He had £10 on his arrival. Last year his income was equal to £400 per annum, and he says, "I hope to do better this year." He is, naturally as firm a believer in the value of goats as live stock as he is in the beneficial qualities, especially to invalids and children, of their milk. He does all the milking himself in the open air, the milk going direct into glass bottles, which are at once sealed hermetically and delivered to his customers. For those who desire the milk is Pasteurised, and goat's milk, butter, and cheese are manufactured on the farm. Milk goats also are bred for sale or hire, and kids are sold for the table. Mr. Sheppee is anxious to see the goat more generally kept by small holders and country dwellers.
