"Much Will Depend."

This morning the Daily News states that Mr. Lord and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries were at Port aux Basques yesterday morning. With Mr. Lord is a Mr. P. Orlie who, according to the Daily News, represents a large syndicate of American capitalists. The Daily News makes also the following strange statement:—"We understand that he accompanies Mr. Lord to Lark's Harbour, and that much will depend upon the result of his visit. Mr. Orlie's opinions being regarded in Gloucester as those of an eminently practical man and expert."

What does the Daily News intend the public to understand by this statement? At the time the Cold Storage Bill was before the Legislature the public was given to understand that Messrs. Trefethen and Lord, with whom the Government contracted, were fish merchants in a big way of business, who were able and willing to carry out the terms of the contract themselves; that they had already acquired the Lark Harbor property, and that they were most anxiously awaiting the ratification of the contract in order to start in with the fishery operation. Time ran on. The Legislature closed, and now after months we are told that much depends on how a representative of some syndicate is impressed. We ask if any other reasonable construction can be put upon the words of the Daily News than that the Government made a Cold Storage contract with Messrs. Trefethen and Lord, and that now these gentlemen are either endeavouring to sell the concession which they obtained from the Morris Government for nothing, or are promoters who are endeavouring to promote a company to take up for a consideration the concessions which the Morris Government gave them, and that the sale or promotion depends on Mr. Orlie's report.

This is not what the people were given to understand when the contract was put before the Legislature.

Here and There.

GATE RECEIPTS.—The gate receipts at last night's match were the smallest yet this season, totalling only \$21.00.

ST. BON'S OLD BOYS.—St. Bon's old boys will meet Wednesday evening in the College to arrange a programme for the July reunion on the 14th.

HAS 750 EMIGRANTS.—The Pretorian has on board this trip 150 emigrants, mostly from England. Several will settle in the Eastern Provinces of Canada while others will go to the North West.

POLICE COURT.—One of the boys charged with stealing 24 pipes, valued at \$4.80, the property of Mr. R. Wright, Monday, pleaded guilty and was sent down for 3 months. The other gave bonds in \$50 to observe good behaviour for 2 years.

THE PRETORIAN'S OFFICERS.—Mr. Kennear is chief officer; Mr. Walker, chief engineer; Mr. McGamble, formerly of the Mongolian, is chief steward, and Mr. Alexander, late of the Carthaginian, is purser. The ship while at home was put in thorough order.

HOSPITAL PATIENTS.—Lillian Martin, a 17 year old girl of Salvage, B.B., went to Hospital yesterday to have an operation performed for inward trouble. Ernest Hollett, of St. John's, who was down in a schooner to Bonavista Bay, was also brought to Hospital. He had his leg badly injured.

THEY CAMP OUT.—Six young men, who hold positions in different stores and offices in the city, have erected a camp on Nagle's Hill and will begin camping out there to-morrow night for the rest of the season. They had been there the past few years, and walked into the city every morning to work.

BODY BY TRAIN.—The body of Aaron Sisdal, who suicided at Island Cove Sunday last, was brought to town to-day. Undertaker Martin was at the station with a hearse and brought the body to the morgue. It is said that the Jews of the city will make up a fund to send the body home for interment.

Celebrating Their Golden Wedding.

Jarvis, was A.D.C. to the Governor here in years gone by. His son, Mr. Leonard Jarvis, was at one time insurance clerk at Bowring Bros. office here, but is now doing business in Nova Scotia. We congratulate Sir William on the attainment of the anniversary of his golden wedding.

The Georges Collect \$195.64.

The Georges of Newfoundland in common with those of the rest of the Empire, have collected here in this country the sum of \$195.64 to subscribe for a suitable present to His Majesty King George in honour of the Coronation. This amount has been paid over to His Excellency the Governor for transmission to the Central Committee at London together with the names of the subscribers of which there were 550 in this country. Considering the short time at the disposal of those who had charge of the matter good work was done. Justice Johnson had charge of the collecting and Mr. Geo. J. Adams, Registrar of Deeds of the Supreme Court, was Secretary-Treasurer.

A Splendid Gift.

Yesterday, we understand, Hon. W. C. Job made a splendid gift to the Church Lads Brigade. He then handed over to the Commander of the Brigade the fine new racer Blue Peter which has done such excellent work on Quidi Vidi in our local regatta's.
