**Those Snow Drifts.**

Last night the cross country train, which was due on Saturday, arrived; and this afternoon a mail is expected direct from Sydney by the S. S. Glencoe. This past month has been exceptionally severe, and the snow-drifts abnormal, as all who live out of town know to their cost. The community is greatly becoming more and more dependent on the railway for mail and supplies, and it is likely that this dependence will increase as the years roll by. It will become therefore incumbent on the Reid Newfoundland Company to fit themselves with snow fighting apparatus that they may be able to deal more and more promptly, not only with the snow falls and drifts which may be expected in ordinary course every winter, but with such abnormal condition of affairs as have prevailed largely since Christmas. The Reid Newfoundland Company have great obligations in this respect to the public. The Government is the guardian of these interests. The public have rights which cannot be ignored. While every consideration which is justly due to the Company owing to abnormal conditions, harmony can prevail only when the interests of all are fairly and properly looked after.

**Vessels in Slob.**

The Gaspe for Pernambuco, and the Olive for Barbadoes, which left here yesterday, are caught in the slob off Cape Spear. If the present winds freshen, their is danger of their being drawn in on the land. It will be remembered that under similar conditions the Vidonia was lost at Petty Hr., a few years ago, when Capt. Vine and his crew after landing in over the slob had an awful time of it in a blizzard which raged and they sheltered behind boulders.

**A Laborer Severely Hurt.**

While at work at Harvey & Co's premises last night, loading the Florzel, a laborer named May, who is sometimes afflicted with epilepsy, fell into a lighter alongside the ship, while suffering from the malady and was badly cut about the head and face. The man was lifted up to the pier and a doctor was summoned to attend him after which he was driven home.

**Broke Her Leg.**

While on the way to first mass at the R. C. Cathedral at 7.30 a.m. Tuesday, Mrs. Greene, widow of the late Hon. D. J. Greene, fell and broke her leg. Friends passing, rendered all necessary assistance and securing a cab drove her home, where a doctor was summoned and set the fractured bone.

**Making a Long Run.**

The S. S. Kamford left Sydney on Friday last coal laden for this port, and up to 1 p.m. to-day had not arrived. She is no doubt, detained by adverse weather. A steamer was blowing in the offing to-day which might be her or the Galveston from New York, the Ameriana from Liverpool or the Glencoe from Sydney.

**STEAMER IN OFFING.**—At 12.30 to-day a steamer was blowing in the offing and the pilot boat went out for her. It is thought to be the Ameriana from Liverpool.

**Little Mystery's Long Voyage**

The English schr. Little Mystery, Capt. Greet, left Trapani salt laden for this port on November 18th and was spoken to on December 13th 25 miles west of Cadiz, since which time she has not been heard of. There is a crew of six men, and it is thought she has been meeting hard weather and will turn up in due course. Capt. Greet is well known in marine circles here and his many friends hope that his ship has not met with any accident.

**Aureola Lost.**

Crosbie & Co. received a cablegram from London this morning, saying that the Aureola had been lost in mid-ocean and the crew taken off and brought into London, all well. Capt. Olsen was on the voyage from Troon, Scotland, with a cargo of coal for the Nfld. Produce Co., and left that port 72 days ago. The news comes as a great relief to the friends of the crew. No further particulars have been received.

**Seamen Gave Trouble.**

Yesterday the brig, Dunure, was ready to leave for Brazil, but pretty nearly all the crew left her and went ashore, but were rounded up and brought on board to-day. The cook left her to-day and another man was taken on in his place. Of late it has been noticed that when vessels haul into the stream when ready for sea, boats accompany them and the men are enticed by those who go out in such boats to come ashore and drink. It is the intention of owners of vessels and captains to appeal to the authorities to put an end to this condition of affairs which entails trouble and loss on them.

**The Injured Man Here.**

The s.s. Stella Maris returned from Bay de Verde this morning at 11 o'clock bringing the young man O'Brien who was accidentally shot there yesterday while out hunting sea birds. He was very weak and appeared to be of a delicate constitution. He was taken to the Hospital immediately on arrival. The gun went off while lying on the thwarts in the boat and the charge entered his legs. He has a neck and sister living and is their only support. It is believed that one leg—if not two—will have to be amputated. Messrs. Crosbie and White went down in the Stella Maris and returned in her.

There was a rumor put in circulation in town this morning that the Olive had been lost going up this coast yesterday on the way to Barbadoes. There is no truth in the report. The S. S. Adventure passed the Olive off Bay Bulls at 1 p.m. yesterday when the former was coming to this port and she was going along at a clipping rate all sail set.

**Barratry Case.**

A barratry case is being worked up in Conception Bay which may create a great sensation when all the evidence is in. One of the parties said to be involved has already skipped out of the country. The police are watching the trains closely to see the other man does not go. The vessel was lost on the Labrador last summer and the insurance was collected.
