On resuming the Feildians put up a hard fight to equalize. Pinsent and Winter passed the Star back division twice but the latter each time shot erratically.


The teams crossed at half time:

Marine Disasters Fund.

The general committee formed at the public meeting on Tuesday to consider the raising of funds for the relief of those left in distress by the loss of the s.s. Erna and several vessels recently, met yesterday afternoon. The Secretary read notes of regret from the Bishop of Newfoundland, Rev. Dr. Rogers and the President of the British Society at their inability to attend, but promising co-operation; and also from Mr. Jack Rossley, offering to give proceeds of an entertainment at his theatre after a deduction out of pocket expenses. The performers, however, will give their services free.

A motion was carried to add to the Committee all clergymen and stipendiary magistrates. A motion to establish a permanent "Marine Disasters Fund" did not meet with general approval and was withdrawn.

An Executive Committee was appointed, consisting of: His Worship Mayor Ellis, Chairman; G. C. Fearn, Esq., Hon. Secretary; Hon. Jno. Harris, Hon. Treasurer; Joseph Outerbridge, Esq., Hon. Geo. Knowling, J. C. Hepburn, Esq., and Hon. J. A. Robinson.

At the instance of the Mayor a subscription list was at once opened.

VANCOUVER, June 21.
The first sod of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway is to be turned at North Vancouver, on July 1st, by Sir Richard McBride, the Premier of British Columbia. This railway will connect this city with Ft. George, and eventually will be used as the Vancouver connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific.

KINGSTON, June 21.
There was nearly a panic at Barmfield Camp when it was found that a bale of ammunition had been served to the 8th and 9th brigadier regiments for tactical purposes. When the men began to fire, bullets whistled through the camp ground, causing great alarm. Finally the tactics were temporarily stopped and the ammunition was recalled. A board of enquiry is looking into the matter.

LONDON, June 21.
Capt. Rostron, of the Carpathia, received the united thanks of the British Government and the country at to-day's sitting of the Board of Trade enquiry into the Titanic disaster. Sir Rufus Isaacs, Attorney General, said that he desired to take the earliest opportunity, which the Government had been able to get, to express to Capt. Rostron, on behalf of His Majesty's Government, how deeply grateful they were to him for his conduct, and for the large number of lives he had been instrumental in saving. Lord Mersey and Sir Robert Finlay united with Sir Rufus in extending thanks and congratulations to Capt. Rostron.

CHICAGO, June 21.
The Taft forces in the Republican National Convention further demonstrated their control of that body to-day. The Convention took up the contests from many States, and in each instance the Taft delegates were declared entitled to their seats by the high water vote of 405 out of 406 to the close margin of 542 to 529. The latter vote was in the Californian cases. Despite the fact that the Roosevelt people were defeated in all their fights to-day, there was no indication of a bolt. Some of the Roosevelt leaders feared the Californians might take matters in their own hands and fall to observe the Roosevelt programme set for the Convention to the end. When adjournment was taken to-night until 10 a.m. tomorrow, Washington contest cases still remained unsettled. There is a likelihood of more bitterness between the opposing forces. After the Californian case was settled the delegates seemed in much better humor, and there was much fun during the afternoon when minor contests passed through without any opposition from Roosevelt forces.

Got Increase.


