Recent Arrest Recalls Famous Piracy Case.

The arrest of Eugene Degraeve, the convict, on the charge of attempted robbery at Namur Cathedral recalls one of the most famous French criminal cases. In 1889, Degraeve was called "the Belgian Dreyfus."

On August 24 of that year President Loubet, signed Degraeve's pardon. His brother Leonce, had died in penal settlements the year before. In 1889 the sentence on the Degraeve brothers, which the naval court of Brest pronounced in 1892, was held by many to be a gross miscarriage of justice, and there was no pro and anti-Degraevists, as there were Dreyfusards and anti-Dreyfusards.

When Eugene Degraeve was pardoned he published a book—a well-written and very clever book-demanding a retrial so that he might disprove

And now he is once more in prison on charge of conspiring to rob Namur Cathedral of treasures valued at a great price, and he once more accuses justice of a shameful blindness. As Dreyfus is almost forgotten, and France no longer believes in Degraeve's stories, another hurried journalist has rechristened Eugene Degraeve. This time he is called "Captain Crook."

Carrying a Locomotive on Cable.

The giant hands that are refashioning the surface of the earth at man's bidding do something more than merely pile up heaps of rock in river courses that the streams may be diverted to fields where water is needed, or tunnel through mountains or level off hills. Recently it was necessary to carry a railway locomotive from one side of the Rio Grande-River to the other in connection with the construction of the Elephant Butte dam. To run the engine on rails to the nearest switching point and thus get it to its destination would take too long. So the power that has been trained to exert itself at the twist of a switch or the turn of a throttle was called into play and it picked up the engine and carried it across the river. There was a cableway of steel ropes stretched from one side of the river to the other for the purpose of transporting material as needed. The cable swings 200 feet above the surface of the river. The locomotive is a 20-ton affair, was equipped with slings which were in turn attached to the travellers on the cable, and it was easily and quickly transported from one side to the other.
