

#### German Food Roits Serious.

Paris, May 10 .- The Socialist Party sued a statement to-day declaring it ad not authorized any of its members to act as delegates at the recent inter tional conference in Switzerland.

It develops that three members o he Chamber of Deputies belonging to the socialist group, M. Rafin-Dugens, Alexander Blanc and M. Brisson, attended the conference, which also was attended by Herr Hoffman, a member of the Prussian Diet and editor of the Vorwaerts, and Herr Fleissner, a Saxony Deputy.

The proceedings of the conference were not made public, but it is understood that the French Deputies were nformed that riotous conditions in Germany, cwing to the food shortage, were much more serious than was generally known.

### Says Allies Will Resort to Force.

If it is Necessary to Transport Serbian Troops Across Greek Territory to Salonika Front.

Berlin, May 12.-The Entente Powers have decided to resort to force, if necessary, to transport the Serbian troops at Corfu across Greek territory to the Salonika front, the Overseas News Agency says. The official press bureau, as quoted by Petrograd newspapers, announces that the Greek government is adhering to its decision to refuse permission for passage of the Serbian troops. The News Agency says: "The

Russians believe Greece is actuated by fear of Germany. The entente powers have decided to employ force, being prompted by desire to determine definitely the policy of Greece. The entente ministers have received orders to act in conformity with the allied military activities.
