NICKEL**Capt. Robert D. Cave Enters into Rest.**

Safe home, safe home in port! Rent cordage, shattered deck, Torn sails, provision short, And only not a wreck! But oh! the joy upon the shore To tell our voyage—perils o'er.

The passing of Capt. Robert Dixon Cave, at his residence, Ringwood, Leslie St., last evening creates a void in our city and dominion that can never be filled. His life, as his acquaintances knew was a strenuous one; full of dangers and perils among the stormy tempests of the Atlantic and other oceans, but the evening of it was spent in quietude and his transition to the unknown world peaceful—the Angel of Death touched him and he slept. Captain Cave was a native of St. John's having been born here about seventy-three years ago. Like many another Newfoundland lad of his day, the sea made an appealing call which he could not resist, and forgoing the offer of a position of ease the youth decided to take up the nautical profession. While serving his apprenticeship it was soon apparent that his was no ordinary intellect, and those with whom he served saw in him a great man. When in his early twenties he was given his first command and for nearly forty years he successfully mastered the tempests of many seas. His time was spent chiefly in carrying our staple product to the foreign markets, and a few of our mariners had a larger acquaintance in the South American ports. While he was ever courteously received by the Brazilian business people, Captain Cave's greatest concern were the interests of the Newfoundland shippers. Honest and fearless, a loyal son of the old colony, he was ever ready to uphold the reputation of his native country and his opinions were always respected. Fifteen years ago the deceased retired from the sea to accept a position in the Civil Service and until a year or two ago performed the duties of Government gauger in connection with the Customs Department. In October last he was afflicted with heart trouble and since then had been confined to his room. He knew the end was near, but having lived a well spent life the Valley of Death had no terrors for him, and he entered the vale fully conscious, surrounded by his family who were incessant in their care and attention to him. Captain Cave leaves a widow, four daughters, Mrs. A. E. Bennett, of Mission City, British Columbia, Mrs. J. A. Hisecock, Mrs. Stanley James, and Miss Florence Cave of this city and one son, Lt.-Com. Ernest Cave, now resident in England. Captain Cave was an ideal husband and father whose greatest comfort it was to be with his family, and to them the writer who was one of his closest friends extends sincerest sympathy. The funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon.
