The name of John Rorke has already been mentioned more than once as Chairman of important meetings held during the cholera scare, etc. The Hon. John Rorke got his title for life from H.M. Queen Victoria for his long and honorable career as Member of the House of Assembly for the district of Carbonear. He was better and nore familiarly known as "Honest" John Rorke, and remained actively connected with business affairs till he was well over 90 years of age.

He was born in Athlone, County Cavan, Ireland, in 1807. He came to Newfoundland in 1824, as clerk to Bennett & Ridley, who at that time carried on business at Adam's Cove, in Bay de Verde. Thomas Ridley and John Rorke were cousins, and nephews of William Bennett. Thomas Ridley had started business on his own account in Harbor Grace. John Rorke managed a branch business for him at Adam's Cove, but in these old records that I have, there is an anhouncement (Dec. 11th, 1832) that this partnership carried on between Thomas Ridley & Co. and John Rorke of Adam's Cove, under the name of John Rorke & Co., is dissolved, and this firm will be carried on in future wholly by John Rorke.
